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1.0 PREFACE

On behalf of the Departmental Committee on Labour and Social Welfare and pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 199, I present to the House the Report of the Committee on the 15th World Athletics Championships held in Beijing, China.

A delegation of the Committee attended the Championships from 20th-30th August, 2015.

1.1 Mandate of the Committee

The Committee is established pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order No. 216, with the following terms of reference:-

- I. Investigate, inquire into, and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operations and estimates of the assigned ministries and departments;
- II. Study the programme and policy objectives of ministries and departments and the effectiveness of the implementation.
- III. Study and review all legislation referred to it.
- IV. Investigate and inquire into all matters relating to the assigned ministries and departments as they may deem necessary and as may be referred to them by the House.

1.4 Committee Observations and Recommendations

1.4.1 Observations

The Committee observed that:-

- 1. All athletes tested negative for doping during the trials in Kenya but two female athletes tested positive at the Beijing training camp towards the eve of the championship. The Committee noted with concern that doping among the Kenyan athletes tarnished the image of the country and the reputation of the athletes.
- 2. Some athletes had no training gears yet NIKE, the official supplier of sport gears to Kenya had issued enough uniforms for the athletes.
- 3. Kenya is a powerful nation in athletics, but the talent is limited to long and middle distance races, hence the need for efforts to ensure representation in other categories.

1.4.2 Recommendations

The Committee recommends that:-

- 1. The Ministry of Sports, Culture and the Arts should formulate an Anti-Doping legislation to curb the doping menace and adhere to international practices and procedures.
- 2. The Ministry of Sports, Culture and the Arts should facilitate in the establishment of an anti-doping testing facility in Kenya that would meet the World Anti-Doping Agency standards to enable testing of Kenyan athletes locally.
- 3. The Ministry of Sports, Culture and the Arts should investigate the claims for non-provision of sporting gears to athletes with a view to taking action on all officers of Athletics Kenya who will be found culpable.
- 4. The Ministry of Sports, Culture and the Arts should use the momentum gained on the short races and field events in order to have more athletes participate in the events in future championships.

2.0 INTRODUCTION

The 15th World Athletics Championships was officially opened by the Chinese President, Xi Jinping, at the Beijing National Stadium on Saturday 22nd Aug, 2015 ahead of the evening events including women's shotput and men's 10,000m final.

The event was held from 22^{nd} – 30^{th} August, 2015 in Beijing, China. Kenya topped the medal table for the first time, with seven gold, six silver and three bronze medals. The United States won eighteen medals, six gold, six silver and six bronze. Host nation China, finished 11^{th} on the medals table, while Russia, the overall winner and host in 2013, finished ninth.

The event was primarily held at the Beijing National Stadium, which served as the athletics venue during the 2008 Summer Olympics. Weather concerns prompted a reduction in capacity for the World Championships in Athletics; only the lower and middle tiers of the stadium were open, capping the venue at around 54,000 spectators rather than its capacity of 80,000.

Athletics Kenya (AK) is the governing body for the sports (track and field) in Kenya. It is a member of the IAAF and Confederation of African Athletes. AK organizes athletics competitions held in Kenya. It also sends Kenyan teams to international championships.

Kenya named a team of 46 athletes and 11 team officials to the 15th Athletics World Championships in Beijing, China as it sought to increase its medal tally. The selected Kenyan team for Beijing was as follows:-

3.0 BACKGROUND

The World Championships in Athletics is an event organized by the International Association of Athletics Federation (IAAF). Originally, it was planned to be held every four years, but this changed after the third edition in 1991 and it has since been run every two years. It's a competition comprising track and field athletics events available to male and female athletes from any of the IAAF's 213 member federations.

The idea of having an Athletics World Championships was around well before the competition's first event in 1983. In 1913, the IAAF decided that the Olympic Games would serve as the World Championships for athletics. This was considered suitable for over 50 years until in the late 1960s when the desire of many IAAF members to have their own World Championships began to grow. In 1976 at the IAAF Council Meeting in Puerto Rico, an Athletics World Championships separate from the Olympic Games was approved.

Following bids from Stuttgart, West Germany and Helsinki, Finland, the IAAF Council awarded the inaugural competition to Helsinki, to take place in 1983 and be held in the Helsinki Olympic Stadium, where the 1952 Summer Olympics had been held.

Two IAAF world championship events preceded the inaugural edition of the World Championships in Athletics in 1983. The 1976 World Championships had just one event – the men's 50 kilometer walk. The event was dropped from the Olympic programme for the 1976 Summer Olympics and the IAAF responded by setting up their own contest. Four years later, the 1980 World Championship contained only two newly approved women's events-400 meters hurdles and 3000 meters, neither of which featured on the programme for the 1980 Summer Olympics.

Championship records are set when an athlete achieves the best mark in an event at one of the editions of the championships. World, area, and national records have been set at the championships over the course of its history.

Competitors at the World Championships come from around the globe and records have been broken by athletes from all six continents. The United States has been the most successful competitor at the World Championships in both medals and records.

Four athletes hold multiple records: Marion Jones holds both the individual and relay record in the 100 meters, Michael Johnson holds individual and relay records in the 400 meters, Jackie Joyner-Kersee broke both the heptathlon and long jump records in 1987, and Jarmila Kratochvilova set the records in the 400 and 800 meters at the inaugural Championships in 1983. Kratochílová's records have gone unbeaten for over 30 years and are the two oldest records of the Championships.

Over the years, the competition has grown in size. In 1983 an estimated 1,300 athletes from 154 countries participated. By the 2003 competition, in Paris, it had grown to 1,679 athletes with coverage being transmitted to about 198 different countries.

There has also been a change in composition over the years, with several new events, all for women, being added. By 2005 the schedule for men and women was almost equal. The only differences being the men had the extra event of the 50 km walk, while women competed in the 100m hurdles and heptathlon compared to the men in the 110m hurdles and decathlon respectively.

The following list shows when new events were added for the first time.

- 1987, women's 10,000m and 10km walk were added.
- 1993, women's triple jump was added.
- 1995, women's 5000m was added, replacing the 3000m race.
- 1999, women's pole vault and hammer were added and the women's 20km walk replaced the 10 km walk.
- 2005, women's 3000m steeplechase was added.

(ii) Participating nations

Two hundred and seven countries with a total of 1,933 athletes were entered out of which 1,771 athletes from 205 countries actually competed excluding reserve athletes and non-starters. The biggest delegation was the one from the USA with 130 athletes. Two countries, Ghana and South Sudan were set to participate, but none of their athletes showed up.

Kenya is renowned for producing some of the world's top track as exemplified at the World Championship in South Korea, when she finished third behind USA and Russia.

Talented athletes have always emerged from Africa. But no other nation on the continent has been able to match Kenya's consistent ability to produce champions year in, year out. The runners have an institutional structure they can plug into as they come up in the sport.

The combination of high altitude, optimal conditions and the global economy of running has inspired Kenyan athletes to become the best in the world. Moreover, the level of professionalism and hard work is what distinguishes Kenyan athletes from their competitors. They have a chance to be the best in the world and that is what they become.

4.0 KENYA'S PERFORMANCE AT THE 2015 WORLD ATHLETICS CHAMPIONSHIPS

Kenya made history by being the first African country which has led the medal table at the end of a major international athletics meeting. It is also the third most successful country in the games 32-year history, after the US and Russia, with 50 gold medals and 128 overall.

Kenya is a powerful nation in Athletics, but the talent is limited to long and middle distance running. Separate trials are used to pick athletes for major international championships. Top Kenyan athletes usually attend these events, since those who skip them are likely to miss major championships as well. Many leading Kenyan runners mostly compete in Europe. National championships and trials are the only events where local spectators can see them competing.

Kenya won a total of 16 medals, with seven gold, six silver and three bronze medals. The final gold medal for the country was won by Asbel Kiprop in the 1,500m. His was part of a strong Kenyan performance in its traditional domains of middle and long distance running, with gold medals for David Rudisha in the men's 800m, Vivian Cheruiyot in the women's 10,000m and Ezekiel Kemboi and Hyvin Kiyeng Jepkemoi triumphing in the men's and women's 3,000m steeplechase, respectively.

Nicholas Bett won in the 400m hurdles and Julius Yego became the first Kenyan field event athlete to win a medal at the championships with victory in the men's javelin.

Geoffrey Kipsang Kamworor (Men's 10,000meters), Conseslus Kipruto (Men's 3000 metres steeplechase), Faith Chepngetich Kipyegon (Women's 1500 metres), Caleb Mwangangi Ndiku

(Men's 5000 metres), Helah Kiprop (Women's Marathon), Elijah Motonei Manangoi (Men's 1500 metres) won Silver medals for the country. Paul Kipngetich Tanui (Men's 10,000 metres), Brimin Kiprop Kipruto (Men's 3000 Metres Steeplechase) and Eunice Jepkoech Sum (Women's 800 Metres) won Bronze medals.

(ii) Two Kenyan athletes provisionally suspended after failing drug tests

As part of the event, the IAAF conducted a wide-reaching anti-doping programme. This included information-led targeted tests in the months previous to the championships and testing of athletes in and outside of competition during the championships. In total, the IAAF undertook 1405 instances of athlete doping controls in Beijing. This included 662 blood tests to inform the longitudinal athlete programme.

Initial analysis identified two failed tests both from Kenyan women: hurdler Koki Manunga and sprinter Joyce Nakhumicha Zakary who competed in the women's 400m heats. Both were disqualified from the competition.
