II. FORWARD BY THE CABINET SECRETARY

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

During the period under review, tremendous achievements have been realised in the implementation of the Single Customs Territory (SCT), as EAC continue to implement and consolidate gains from the Customs Union. These include:

- i. Continued implementing various aspects of Single Customs Territory (SCT) which has led to consolidating and maintaining gains achieved so far. This measure has resulted in reduction in the time taken to transport goods to Partner States. More products from EAC are now cleared through SCT. It is estimated that the implementation of the SCT has reduced the cost of doing business by about 50% in East Africa.
- ii. Coordinated the participation of micro and small enterprises in the 17th EAC Jua Kali/Nguvu Kazi exhibition held in Kampala, Uganda in December, 2016 where over 200 Kenyan exhibitors participated.
- iii. Coordinated and participated in the comprehensive review of Common External Tariff (CET). Some of the key milestones achieved include:
 - ✓ Regional and National consultant recruited;
 - ✓ Criteria for the classification and categorization of Goods within the EAC-CET finalised and under application in the on-going review process;
 - ✓ Draft data collection instruments touching on different regimes e.g. duty remission, exports and imports under different Regional Economic Communities etc. were prepared
- iv. Institutionalized the Common Market Score Card and coordinated the preparation, and launch of the common market scorecard 2016 which tracks the progress in the implementation of the common market provisions on free movement of persons, goods and services;
- v. Finalized the EAC common market score card 2017 on movement of labour and rights of establishment and residence;
- vi. Prepared two (2) regional monitoring reports on implementation of the EAC Common Market Protocol;
- vii. Prepared two (2) National Reports on the implementation of the EAC Common Market Protocol;
- viii. Finalized the negotiations of the East Africa Community-European Union Economic Partnership Agreement (EAC-EU EPA), and signed and ratified the same to facilitate EU market access to Kenya's horticultural crops and flowers;
 - ix. Finalized the EAC Tax Treaty Policy and EAC Model Tax Treaty which are critical in tax negotiations with third party;
 - x. Finalized the EAC framework on harmonization of domestic taxes to guide the process of developing the EAC Tax Policy on harmonisation of domestic taxes;
 - xi. Successfully negotiated and finalized the Bills on establishment of EAC Monetary Institute and EAC Statistics Bureau;
- xii. Coordinated the negotiations leading to the adoption of the Confederation as the model for the EAC Political Federation by the 18th Ordinary Summit of EAC Heads of State in May, 2017;
- xiii. Coordinated the development, launch and roll out of the EAC e-Passport;
- xiv. Developed and Ratified the EAC Protocol on Sanitary and Phyto-Sanitary Measures (SPS) which seeks to harmonize standards in trade in the agricultural sector products;
- xv. Coordinated the negotiations and launching of Voi-Mwatate-Taveta-Arusha

- road construction to link Northern Corridor with Arusha Namanga road for interconnectivity of the region in order to facilitate trade and movement of people;
- xvi. Build capacity of border regulatory agencies at Lunga Lunga, Taveta, Namanga and Isebania for familiarization on the OSBP operations;
- xvii. Coordinated and participated in the development of mechanisms for joint planning and exchange of information on the exploration, exploitation, and development of energy resources;
- xviii. Coordinated the participation of Kenya in joint marketing of EAC as a single tourist destination in international forums;
- xix. Established EAC Clubs in thirty (30) Universities and launched EAC Clubs in fifty-five (55) secondary schools to serve as pilot schools for nationwide outreach and enhance youth participation in the EAC process;
- xx. Published and disseminated Guidelines on Establishment and Operations of EAC Clubs and A Journey through the EAC as support materials for vibrant EAC Club activities;
- xxi. Concluded agreements for Mutual Recognition (MR) of academic and professional qualifications and certificates for Land Surveyors, Veterinarians, Nurses and Midwives.

Emerging issues

- 1. Consensus on alternative financing options for the EAC to address issues of equity and sustainability of EAC programmes, projects, organs and institutions, will have far reaching financial implications since Kenya will be expected to contribute more than the other Partner States if parameters such as GDP, Customs Revenue and Intra-EAC trade are considered in determining the level of contributions by each Partner State.
- 2. Establishment of new EAC Institutions which require contributions from the Partner States namely EAC Monetary Institute, EAC Statistics Bureau, EAC Competition Authority temporary hosted in Arusha, Tanzania, EAC Centre for Aviation Medicine in Nairobi, Kenya, EAC Health Research Commission in Bujumbura, Burundi, EAC Kiswahili Commission in Zanzibar, and EAC Science and Technology Commission in Kigali, Rwanda.
- 3. Implementation of the Government policy on Internship; the new Human Resource and Development Policy, 2016; Medical ex-gratia policy; and operationalization of the superannuation contributory pension scheme require increased financial input.
- 4. Uncertainties in sub-regional integration process including fear of loss of national sovereignty and perceived loss of revenues and employment.
- 5. Multiple memberships to regional economic blocs resulting in conflicting policies and protracted decision making processes.
- 6. The increased threats from international terrorism.
- 7. Perceived prevalence of corruption in governance in the region and ineffective approaches of addressing it.
- 8. Slow implementation of council decisions and summit directives affecting the pace of integration in the EAC.

Implementation challenges, Recommendations and way forward.

- i. Slow implementation of EAC Council Decisions by Partner States which has hampered implementation of programmes and projects at national level;
- ii. Inadequate budgetary funding due to limitation in the General Economic and Commercial Affairs (GECA) sector ceilings and fluctuation of the Kenya shilling against the dollar;
- iii. Lack of adequate research, documentation and database/statistics on East African Community activities;
- iv. Inadequate human resource capacity;

- v. Slow implementation of the customs union: Inconsistent application of the Common External Tariff (CET), re-occurrence and emergence of new NTBs, and restrictive use of rules of origin continue to be detrimental to the free flow of trade;
- vi. Inadequate legal and institutional reforms across the EAC Partner States to facilitate implementation of the EAC Common Market Protocol;
- vii. Slow process in finalizing EAC negotiations due to the principle of consensus and sovereignty of Partner States;
- viii. Delays in ratification of the EAC protocols such as Foreign Policy Coordination, Environment and Natural Resources Management and by implication the delayed implementation of the provisions therein. This has restricted the operational space necessary for the region's response interventions;
- ix. Donor dependence on most of the EAC projects and programs leading to non-implementation of planned activities.

Recommendations:

- 1. Additional resources should be provided towards deepening and widening the integration process through fast tracking the implementation of the Customs Union, Common Market, and laying the foundation for Monetary Union and Political Federation;
- 2. The Department is in the process of establishing additional Regional Integration Centers (RIC) within the major Border Posts with EAC. Additional resources are therefore required to put in place basic infrastructure such as ICT, office accommodation, installation of digital screens at major border posts, furniture and fittings and also sensitizing local business community and stakeholders at the Border Posts;
- 3. There is need to adequately fund Publicity and advocacy programmes on market access, benefits and opportunities of the EAC Integration;

Provide adequate resources to capacity build the SDEACI staff as well as EAC Focal Point officers from Ministries, Counties, Departments and Agencies (MCDAs) to ensure that national interests are secured.

Way Forward:

- i. The Department has enhanced joint training and sensitization of stakeholders at all the six (6) border posts of Namanga, Lungaliunga, Taveta, Isebania, Busia and Malaba;
- ii. The EAC is currently considering the alternative financing mechanism to support the execution of projects and programmes within the region.

REPORT OF THE AUDITOR-GENERAL ON STATE DEPARTMENT OF EAST AFRICAN COMMUNITY INTEGRATION FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2017

REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Qualified Opinion

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of State Department of East African Community Integration set out on pages 10 to 29, which comprise the statement of assets as at 30th June 2017, and the statement of receipts and payments, statement of cash flows and statement of appropriation: recurrent and development combined for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information in accordance with the provisions of article 229 of the Constitution of Kenya and Section 35 of the Public Audit Act. I have obtained all the information and explanations which, to the best of my knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purpose of the audit.

In my opinion, except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis of Qualified Opinion section of my report, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of State Department of East African Community Integration as at 30 June 2017, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended, in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (Cash Basis) and comply with the Public Finance Management Act, 2012.

In addition, as required by Article 229(6) of the Constitution, except for the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion and Other Matter sections of my report, based on the procedures performed, I confirm that nothing has come to my attention to cause me to believe that public money has not been applied lawfully and in an effective way.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

1. Arrears of Subscriptions to Inter University Council for East Africa

Information available indicate that initially the contributions to Inter University Council for East Africa was effected through the Ministry of Education. However, the Ministry failed to remit contributions dating back from financial years 1980/1981 up to 2003/2004, resulting to accumulated arrears totalling USD 6,186,908 or Kshs.643,438,432 at an exchange rate of Kshs.104 to the dollar.

As at 30 June 2017 the State Department of East African Community Integration had paid arrears totalling Kshs.562,997,968 or USD 5,413,442 leaving a balance of

Kshs.80,440,464 or USD 773,466 outstanding. However, evidence of receipt by the Inter University Council for East Africa was not made available for audit review. Consequently, the accuracy, completeness and acknowledgement of the contribution arrears of Kshs.643,438,432 could not be ascertained as at 30 June 2017.

2. Pending Bills

Audit of pending bills records indicate that the State Department had unpaid suppliers bills totalling Kshs.6,246,965 for the financial year 2015/2016 which were carried forward to 2016/2017. A review of the position at the time of audit in January 2018 disclosed that out of the total pending bills amounting to Kshs.6,246,965, so far Kshs.5,323,465 had been paid leaving a balance of Kshs.923,500. However, had the bills been paid in the year under review, the statement of receipts and payments would have reflected a surplus of Kshs.2,636,214 instead of the surplus of Kshs.3,610,750 as at 30 June 2017.

No reason has been given for carrying over pending bills from year to year.

3. Somali IGAD Peace Talks Pending Claim

In October 2002, M/s Asis Hotel Ltd was requested by Government to offer accommodation to delegates attending the Somali IGAD Peace talks in Eldoret Town. Upon conclusion of the talks, the government delayed in settling the principal amount for the services rendered and the matter was lodged in court to recover the agreed amount of Kshs.65,000,000.

In the ruling of Civil Case. No.194 of 2009, the then Ministry of East African Community was ordered to pay the hotel a sum of Kshs.65,000,000 within sixty (60) days failing to which it would attract interest at 12% from the date of default until payment in full.

However, there was a delay of 28 months by Ministry in paying the hotel following the lapse of judgement decree within 60 days and the costs of the suit awarded by the Court. The decretal amount of Kshs.65,000,000 was finally settled on 19 April 2013 upon which it had attracted interest totalling Kshs.20,991,905. Various correspondences from the Attorney General urged the State Department to settle the interest accrued of Kshs.20,991,905 after the settlement of the Kshs.65 Million principal amount.

A review of the position of the claim as at the time of audit in January 2018 indicates that the interest accrued claim totalling Kshs.20,991,905 had not been settled.

In the circumstances, the unpaid claim is likely to attract further legal actions on interest claims leading to voidable loss of public funds.

4. Outstanding Imprests

The statement of assets reflects an amount of Kshs.1,752,766 relating to outstanding temporary imprests which was due for surrender by 30 June 2017. A review of the position as at the time of audit in January 2018 indicated that imprests totalling Kshs.698,542 were still outstanding beyond the due dates.

No satisfactory explanation was provided for the failure to recover the outstanding imprests in full from defaulting officers' salaries as required.

The audit was conducted in accordance with International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). I am independent of State Department of East African Community Integration management in accordance with ISSAI 30 on Code of Ethics. I have fulfilled other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the ISSAI and in accordance with other ethical requirements applicable to performing audits of financial statements in Kenya. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in my professional judgement, are of most significance in the audit of the financial statements. Except for the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion and Other Matter sections of my report, I have determined that there were no Key Audit Matters to report in the year under review.

Other Matter

1. Budget and Budgetary Performance

1.1 Revenue

The actual receipts amounted to Kshs.1, 507,383,312 against the budgeted amount of Kshs.1,606,515,038 resulting in a shortfall of Kshs.99,131,726 or 6% as tabulated below:

No explanation has been provided for the failure to absorb Kshs. 19,676,68 in the form of Aid for Trade from Trade Mark East Africa (TIMEA).

1.2 Expenditure

Overall, the State Department under spent its budgeted amount by Kshs.48,042,449 or 3.1%. The under expenditure mainly occurred under use of goods and services, transfers to other government entities and acquisition of assets at Kshs.39,916,010 or 11%, Kshs.4,627,187 or 18% and Kshs.2,932,436 or 31% respectively as shown below;

forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances and for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the State Department's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the State Department's ability to continue to sustain its service. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in the auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my audit report. However, future events or conditions may cause the State Department to cease to continue to sustain its services.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.
- Obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the financial information of the State Department's activities to express an opinion on the financial statements.
- Perform such other procedures as I consider necessary in the circumstances.

I communicate with the management regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that are identified during the audit.

I also provide management with a statement that I have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on my independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.

IV. REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT AUDITORS ON THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EAC

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of State Department of EAC Integration for the year ended June 30, 2017, which comprise: (i) a statement of receipts and payments; (ii) a statement of financial assets and liabilities; (iii) a statement of comparative budget and actual amounts; (iv) a statement of pending bills as at June 30, 2017; and (v) a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's responsibility for the financial statements

IX. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principle accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below:

1. Statement of compliance and basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with and comply with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) with particular emphasis on Cash Basis Financial Reporting under the Cash Basis of Accounting and applicable government legislations and regulations. The financial statements comply with and conform to the form of presentation prescribed by the Public Sector Accounting Standards Board of Kenya.

The financial statements are presented in Kenya Shillings, which is the functional and reporting currency of the Department and all values are rounded to the nearest thousand (Kshs'000). The accounting policies adopted have been consistently applied to all the years presented.

The financial statements have been prepared on the cash basis following the Government's standard chart of accounts.

2. Recognition of revenue and expenses

The Department recognises all revenues from the various sources when the event occurs and the related cash has actually been received by the Department. In addition, the Department recognises all expenses when the event occurs and the related cash has actually been paid out by the Department

3. In-kind contributions

In-kind contributions are donations that are made to the Department in the form of actual goods and/or services rather than in money or cash terms. These donations may include vehicles, equipment or personnel services. Where the financial value received for in-kind contributions can be reliably determined, the Department includes such value in the statement of receipts and payments both as revenue and as an expense in equal and opposite amounts; otherwise, the contribution is not recorded.

4. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and cash at bank, short-term deposits on call and highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less, which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value. Bank account balances include amounts held at the Central Bank of Kenya and at various commercial banks at the end of the financial year.

5. Accounts Receivable

For the purposes of these financial statements, imprests and advances to authorised public officers and/or institutions which were not surrendered or accounted for at the end of the financial year is treated as receivables. This is in recognition of the government practice where the imprest payments are recognized as expenditure when fully accounted for by the imprest or AIE holders. This is an enhancement to the cash accounting policy. Other accounts receivables are disclosed in the financial statements.

6. Accounts Payable

For the purposes of these financial statements, deposits and retentions held on behalf of third parties has been recognized as accounts payables. This is in recognition of the government practice of retaining a portion of contracted services and works pending fulfilment of obligations by the contractor and to hold deposits on behalf of third parties. This is an enhancement to the cash accounting policy adopted by National Government Ministries and agencies. Other liabilities including pending bills are disclosed in the financial statements.

7. Noncurrent assets

Noncurrent assets are expensed at the time of acquisition while disposal proceeds are recognized as receipts at the time of disposal. However, the acquisitions and disposals are reflected in the entity fixed asset register a summary of which is provided as a memorandum to these financial statements.

8. Pending bills

Pending bills consist of unpaid liabilities at the end of the financial year arising from contracted goods or services during the year or in past years. As pending bills do not involve the payment of cash in the reporting period, they are recorded as 'memorandum' or 'off-balance' items to provide a sense of the overall net cash position of the Department at the end of the year. Pending bill form a first charge to the subsequent year budget and when they are finally settled, such payments are included in the statement of receipts and payments in the year in which the payments are made.

9. Budget

The budget is developed on the same accounting basis (cash basis), the same accounts classification basis, and for the same period as the financial statements. The Department budget was approved as required by Law and as detailed in the Government of Kenya Budget Printed Estimates. A high-level assessment of the Department's actual performance against the comparable budget for the financial year under review has been included in an annex to these financial statements.

10. Comparative figures

There were no comparative figures for the previous financial year since the Department had no vote.

11. Subsequent events

Events subsequent to submission of the financial year end financial statements to the National Treasury and other stakeholders with a significant impact on the financial statements may be adjusted with the concurrence of National Treasury.
