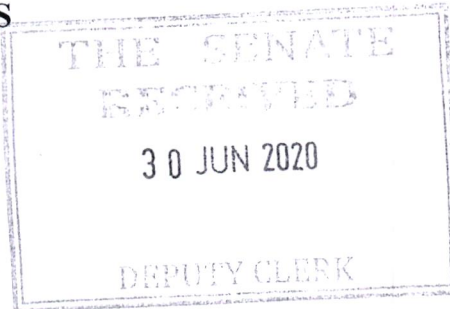

  - (ii) to provide a framework for prohibiting and or regulating certain public gatherings;

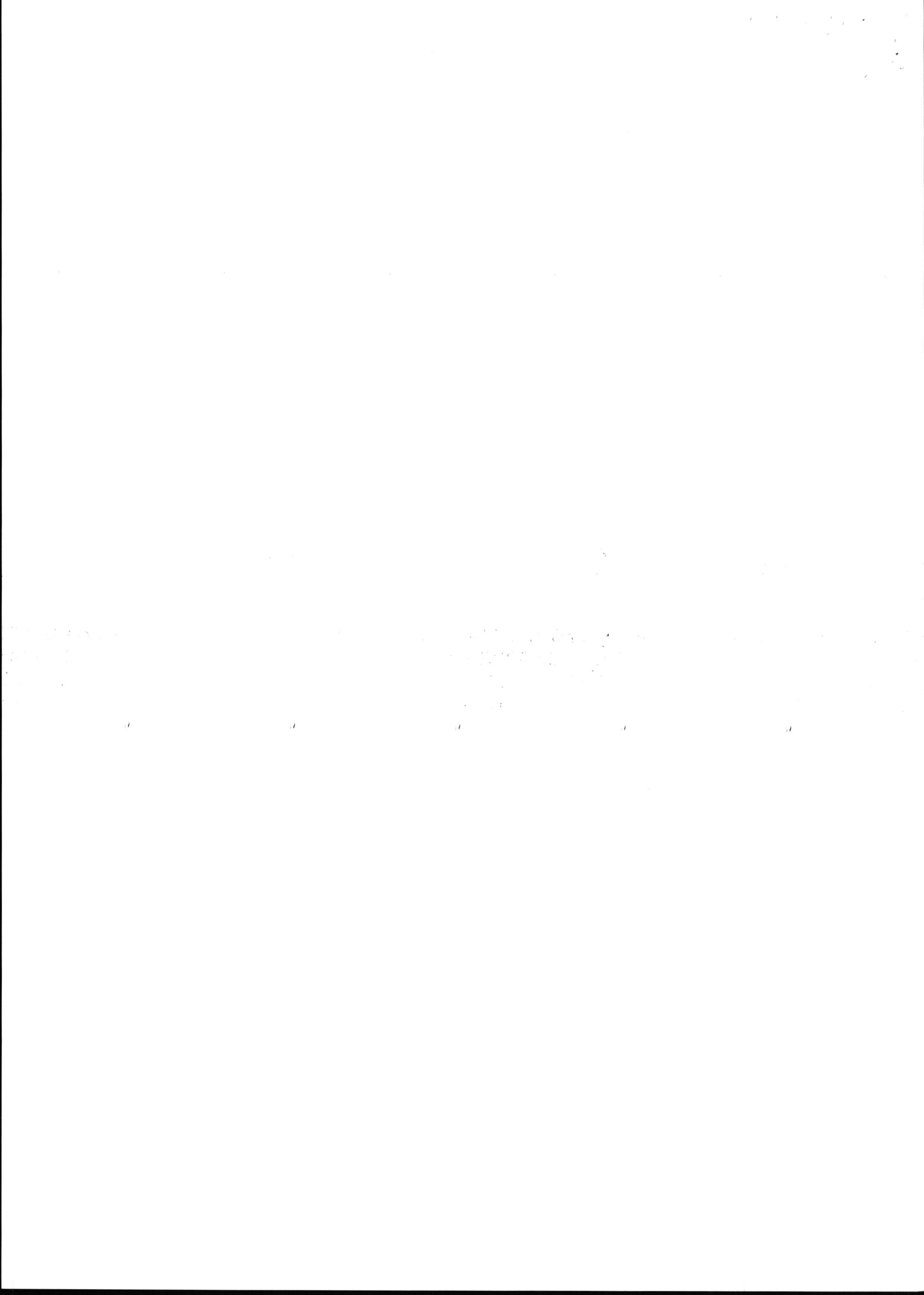

While Nairobi Metropolitan Area has infected persons, not all of them have been identified, tested and isolated, partly due to limitations of contact tracing, and the time required to undertake the said contact tracing. Consequently, without the restrictions imposed by the present Order, interactions with such persons would enable community transmission across the county and outside, thereby jeopardizing efforts at containing the spread of the disease.
12. The Order is reflective of the necessary executive action that, as a matter of necessity, has to be taken urgently, to prevent and contain the further spread of COVID-19.



13. The Order is reflective of the necessary executive action that, as a matter of necessity, has to be taken urgently, to prevent and contain the further spread of COVID-19.



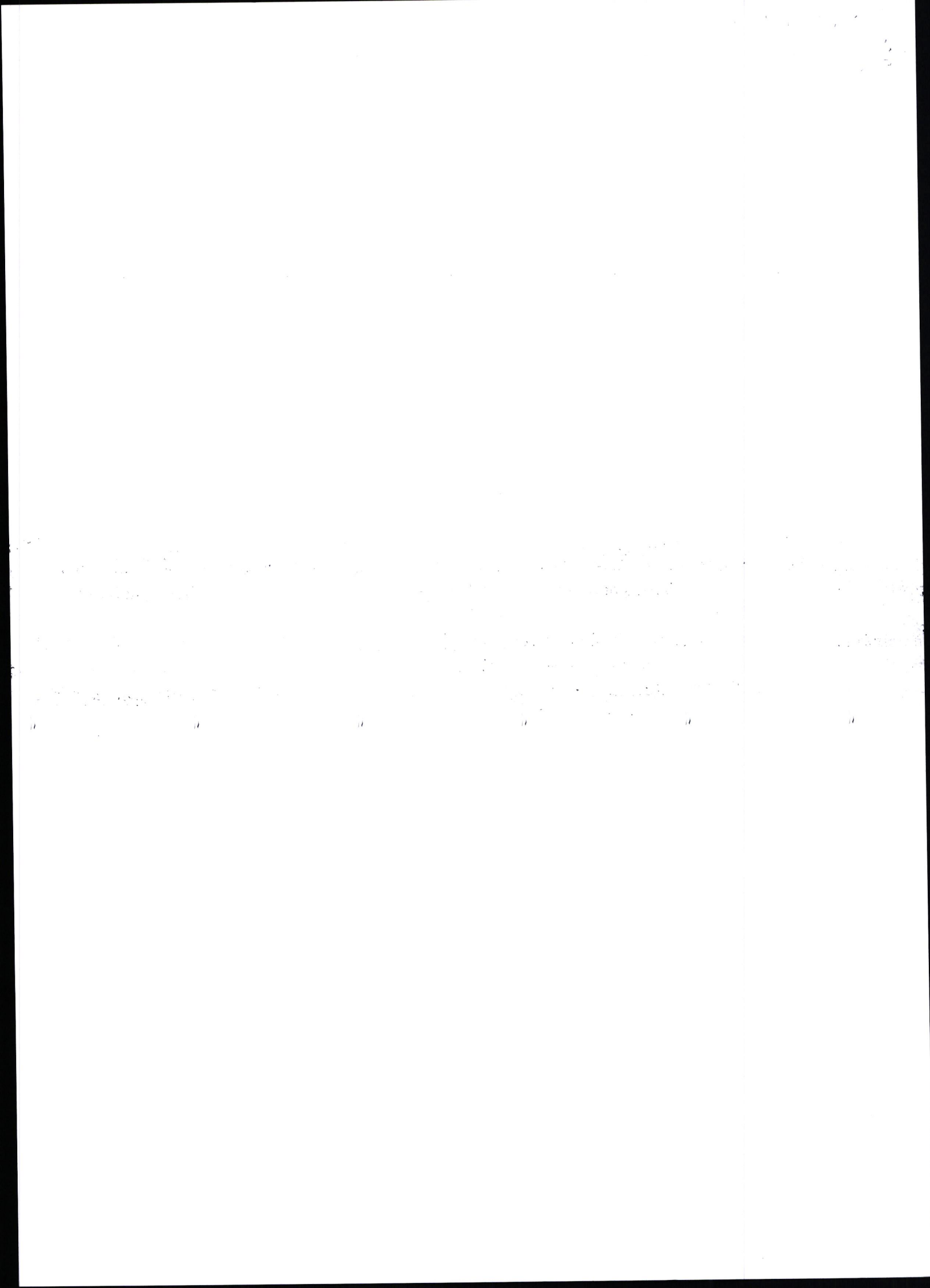

13. The Order is reflective of the necessary executive action that, as a matter of necessity, has to be taken urgently, to prevent and contain the further spread of COVID-19.



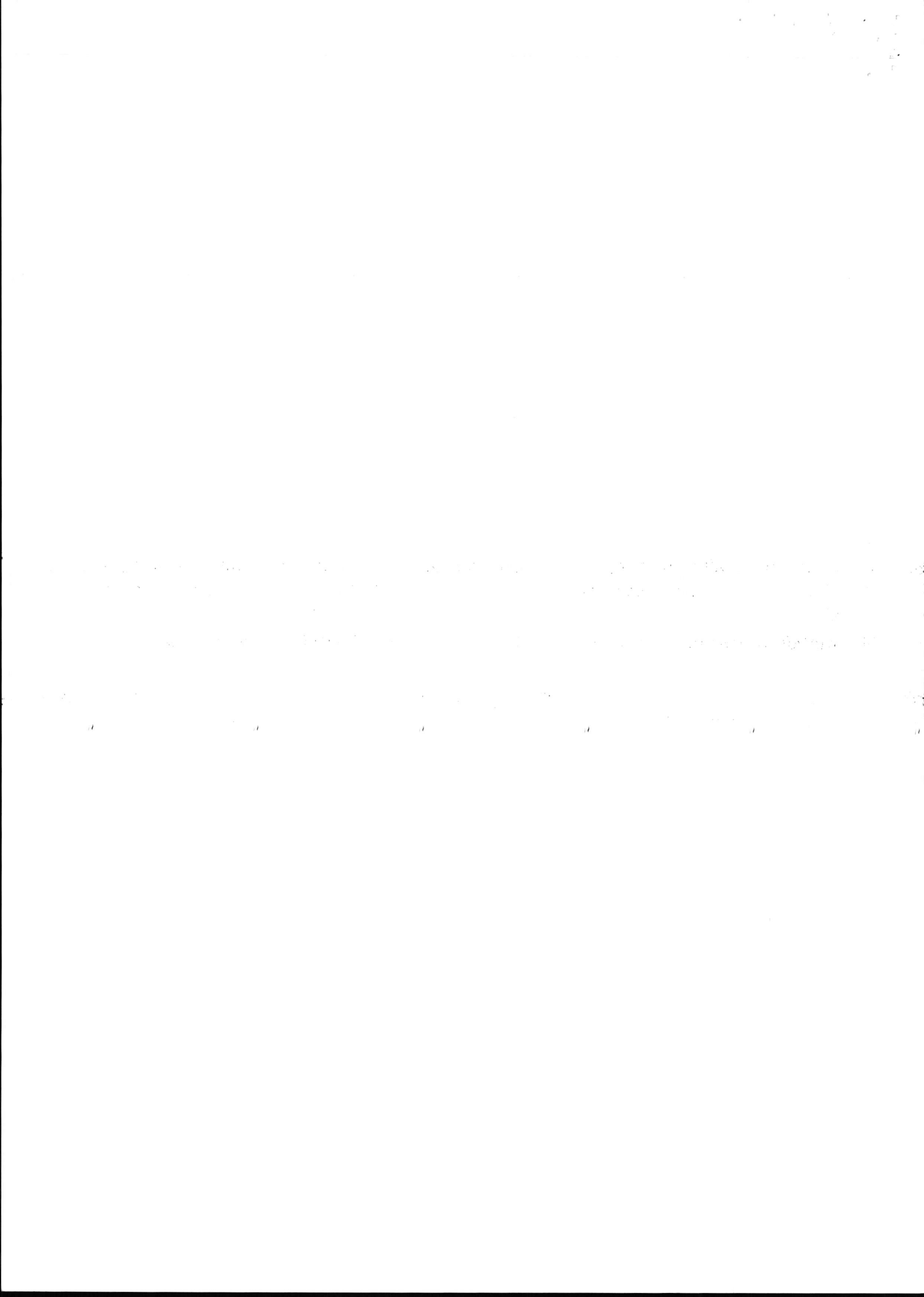
