## PREFACE

## Mr. Speaker Sir,

On behalf of the Members of the Finance Planning and Trade Committee and the Budget Committee I take this opportunity to present to the House the Report and Recommendations of the Joint Committee on question of discrepancies found in the Supplementary Estimates of 2008/2009 Financial year.

Pursuant to provisions of Section 100 of the Constitution, the Supplementary Estimates were Tabled on 22<sup>nd</sup> April 2009 by the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Finance. They were approved by Parliament on 29<sup>th</sup> April 2009. On 5<sup>th</sup> May 2009 Hon Gitobu Imanyara, MP sought a Ministerial Statement from the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Finance concerning a figure of about Kshs 9.2 billion which is shown as having been falsisfied in the documents. The Hon. Members further sought the Speakers guidance on what should be done with documents which are tabled by the government before the House which contain discrepancies.

The Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Finance gave a Ministerial Statement on 6<sup>th</sup> May 2009 on the matter in question. He explained that in Supplementary Estimates it is only the adjustments or changes to the original budget that the Executive arm of the government seeks approval from Parliament for because the budget itself is already approved. However Hon. Imanyara MP stated that there were 200 inconsistencies in the Estimates amounting to Kshs 9,677,189,511. In order to establish the correct position, the Speaker referred the matter to a Joint Committee of Finance, Planning and Trade and Budget Committees. In referring the matter to the Joint Committee, the Hon. Speaker mandated it to <sup>"</sup> inquire into and report to this House on whether or not the there are any inconsistencies that perhaps indicate that public funds have been misapplied". The Joint Committee was constituted pursuant to the Standing Order 185. Standing Order 185 stipulates thus:

- Two or more Committees of the House considering similar matters may, with approval by the Liaison Committee, conduct business as a Joint Committee.
- The quorum of a Joint Committee shall be seven members, excluding the Chairpersons.
- A Joint Committee shall not adopt its report, unless by a resolution supported by not less than a majority of the total number of members of the Joint Committee.

The Joint Committee was further directed to report back to the House on Tuesday 12th May 2009.

In line with your directive the Joint Committee held a series of meetings to deliberate on the matter in question. Evidence was received from:

- The Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Finance
- The Permanent Secretary Treasury and his budget officers

- Jayne Mati Partnership for Change
- Cyprian Nyamwamu Partnership for Change

The Joint Committee received valuable information from Hon. Gitobu Imanyara, MP and the Controller and Auditor General.

Hon. Gitobu Imanyara, MP informed the Committee that the discrepancy affected 200 budget line items as a result of which Kshs 9,677,189,511.00 remained unaccounted for.

The Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Finance informed the Committee that although there were inconsistencies in some principal items of the Supplementary Estimates the overall budget remained consistent with the motion that approved the said Estimates. The overall budget is also consistent with the Supplementary Appropriation Bill. Discrepancies resulted from the budget programme failing to aggregate some of the sub items to the Principal items. The reasons for the failure could be attributed to a computer or human error. There are 211 line items which reflected discrepancy out of 26,000 line items in the printed Estimates. The total amount of the discrepancy of the affected line items amounts to Kshs. 10,763,446,275 of the printed column. The inconsistency does not imply loss of funds. The Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Finance informed the Committee that investigations were under way to establish the real cause of the inconsistency. The Controller and Auditor General informed the Committee that:-

- The difference of Kshs 10,763,446,275.00 was caused by un reconciled discrepancies between the provisions shown in the Printed Estimates for 2008/2009 against various votes, and those appearing in the Supplementary Estimates for the period against the same votes.
- The difference of Kshs 10,763,446,275.00 does not however constitute any loss or misappropriation of public funds.

The Committee received the following information from partnership for change officers:-

- (i) The supplementary Appropriation Bill is based on the contentious documents and Parliament must satisfy itself that it is proceeding on the basis of full and frank disclosure of the facts by the Ministry of Finance.
- (ii) The figures by the Minister do not add up.

## **1.0 INTRODUCTION**

- Section 100 (3) of the Constitution of Kenya stipulates that where, due to changes in the course of the financial year, the finance minister may lay before Parliament the supplementary estimates to cater for additional costs (when the budget is inadequate) or emerging needs or when there is need to reallocate budgeted funds which cannot be spent due to unavoidable circumstances, or revenue collection falls short of target.
- 2. The preparation of the supplementary estimate is triggered by a treasury circular which is issued to the ministries by end of December every year. The supplementary budget allows ministries to regularize the reallocations or virements (e.g. transfers within votes and sub-votes) that may have been made in the course of the year to meet urgent and unexpected expenditures.

### Facts on Supplementary Estimates and Figures

 The Budget information is prepared in a computer based program/ software. The program produces several forms. Each of these forms gives a different level of details. Just like other accounting software, the reports generated give different details depending on request.

Form 1: Gives a budget summary at the sub vote level and consists

- Discussion format reflects all details; and
- Parliamentary format reflects only where changes have occurred.

**Form II:** This also generates two sets of report that includes Discussion format, and Parliamentary format; the head, sub head and item. This is more detailed and contains details of units falling within a sub vote.

**Form III:** This relates to motor vehicle inventory (as concerns the main budget), while it relates to explanatory notes concerning the supplementary estimates. However, the notes are only where there are additions.

4. The purpose of the supplementary estimates being laid in the House is to seek Parliamentary approval regardless of whether it is being reviewed upwards or downwards. This way the Treasury gets the authority to disburse funding to the spending agencies.

## 2.0 PROCEEDINGS OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE

- 5. The Joint Committee held its first meeting on Thursday 07th, May 2009 upon which it outlined its conduct of business. It was resolved that a sub-committee comprising six members would seek the details of the inconsistencies and come up with a report that will be deliberated on by the Joint Committee for approval. However, members of the Joint Committee were free to sit in these meetings when they could find time to do so.
- 6. Among its first undertaking was to go through the supplementary estimates laid before the House by the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Finance. The Joint Committee concurred that there was indeed an error in the supplementary estimates amounting to Kshs 9.67 billion. It is on this basis that the committee sought audience with the PS Treasury.
- 7. The initial meeting with the Permanent Secretary, Treasury and subsequent series of meetings with Treasury officials over three consecutive days revealed the following.
  - That there was indeed a discrepancy in the supplementary estimates tabled on the floor of the House;
  - Acknowledged that a computer error was the cause of the problem, and that investigations had been launched to look into the system;
  - That whereas errors were detected, this did not have any impact on the overall figure as appearing in the printed estimates laid in the House in June 2008.

# 3.0 FINDINGS OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE

9. A total of 36 votes are affected out of 51 votes in the supplementary estimates of recurrent expenditure. The affected votes are as follows:-

10. After a review of what is called the discussion format/accounting format, that is, what is fed into the vote book, we established that this problem occurred due to summation of a few sub items to generate the parliamentary format of the supplementary estimates.

The principle items affected are as follows:-

- 2110300 Personal Allowance Paid as Part of Salary
- 2210100 Utilities Supplies and Services
- 2210300 Domestic Travel and Subsistence and other Transportation Costs
- 2210200 Communication, Supplies and Services
- 2210700 Training Expenses

The sub items that make up the above principle items are as per the attached Annex I (GFS Codes).

### **Key Observations**

11. When Parliament is presented with estimates, whether at printed or supplementary level, the estimates reflect only the changes (upwards or downwards) at the principle level. With this conventional practice in the Joint Committees purview, the Committee made the following key observations.

- (i) That the printed column in the supplementary estimates is changing when in practice it is supposed to remain unaltered. This raises the question of where Treasury got the authority to do so when the law is clear such authority is vested with Parliament.
- (ii) That investigations by the Joint Committee point to a problem in the generation of the parliamentary format of the estimates where some principle items on the

printed column changed on account of non-summation of all sub items that made up the principle item.

 (iii) According to the discussion with Treasury and our own review, these may have been occasioned by:

- Poor editorial finalization of the parliamentary format of the supplementary estimates.
- Poor coding in the system resulting in some sub items not being recognized by the system when the system was summing up.
- (iv) That the sub items that were not summed up did not change, that is no revisions was made on these items. Ordinarily the sub-items do not appear in the parliamentary format.
- (v) Out of the figure of Kshs 9, 677, 189, 511.00 tabled in the House by the Hon.Gitobu Imanyara as money missing and unaccounted for, there is discrepancy of Kshs 5, 953, 102.00 was identified in respect of following ministries:
  - Ministry of Labour and Human Resource Development kshs 2,000,000.00; and
  - Ministry of Gender and Children Development Kshs 3,956,102.00
  - Ministry of Livestock Development Kshs (3,000.00)
- (vi) It was observed from submissions from treasury that the total amount of discrepancy was Kshs. 10, 763, 446, 275.00 and this was from 211 lines from 36 Ministries.

(vii)The extra request supplementary as appearing in column 11 of the document laid on the floor of the House by the Hon. Gitobu Imanyara is misleading as indeed that figure is the new revised item which in most cases is a reduction from the printed level.

## 4.0 **RECOMMENDATIONS**

- 12 The Joint Committee therefore recommends that:-
  - 1. Since there are inconsistencies in the Supplementary Estimates, they should be withdrawn and the correct Estimates resubmitted.
  - 2. An independent forensic audit be done.
  - 3. The Fiscal Management Bill be approved and enacted as a matter of urgency.

13 The Joint Committee is grateful to Hon. Speaker for giving it the opportunity to establish the causes of the inconsistencies. On behalf of the Committee I thank all the people who appeared before us and gave valuable information which has enabled the Committee to conclude this report

14. I cannot forget to thank the Members of the Joint Committee who sat for long hours perusing information brought before the Committee.

15. The dedication shown by the Secretariat has gone a long way in enabling the timely production of this report. For this I thank them too.

# MIN. NO. 01/2009 - PRELIMINARY

The Co- Chairs informed the meeting that following the Speakers directive issued on Wednesday May 6<sup>th</sup>, 2009 that was prompted by a clarification sought by the Hon. Gitobu Imanyara, MP on discrepancies in the Supplementary Budget, the two Committees were mandated to *"inquire into and report to the House on whether or not there are any inconsistencies that perhaps indicate that public funds have been misapplied"*.

The Hon. Gitobu Imanayara was invited to enlighten the Committee on the areas of discrepancies in the supplementary budget.

# MIN. NO. 02/2009 - DISCREPANCIES IN THE BUDGET

The Committee heard that:-

- The Supplementary Estimates do not tally with the original budget estimates approved by the House in June 2008. That 200 items in the Supplementary Budget tabled by the Minister do not tally with the original approved estimates. The discrepancy totals Kshs. 9, 667, 189, 151.
- The discrepancies in the 200 line items are all related to personal allowances.
- Parliament ought to have been informed of any changes to the figures approved in the 2008/2009 budget.

The Committee noted that the issues raised by the Hon. Gitobu Imanyara, MP were pertinent and that there was need to determine if indeed there are discrepancies or inconsistencies in the Supplementary Budget as presented by the Minister for Finance.

# MIN. NO. 03/2009 - PRESENTATION BY THE MINISTRY OF FINANCE

The Committee was taken through the budget process and was further informed that:-

- The Supplementary Estimates are only necessary when there is need for intervention when additional resources are required.
- The Budget is prepared on the basis of taxation and borrowings. During deficit, treasury seeks ways of expenditure cutting or additional borrowing. When cutting expenditure the affected Ministries are consulted and informed accordingly and when borrowing treasury ensures that the domestic debt is sustainable.
- Supplementary Estimates only capture the areas with changes i.e. either reductions or increases.
- There are discrepancies in the supplementary estimates that were caused by a technical computer error. The discrepancy affected the item level, code titled allowances, but does not impact on the overall level of the budget as approved in June 2008. The printed estimates are not altered at any stage and always remain as approved by Parliament.
- Government Ministries only access funds from treasury after the provisional budget or supplementary budget has been approved by Parliament. Expenditure by Ministries is on the basis of the approved Appropriations Act or Supplementary Appropriations Act.

Members were concerned that an error to the tune of Kshs. 9.67 billion could not be traced by treasury before the appropriations books were brought and tabled in Parliament and thus misleading the House.

The Ministry was directed to establish the actual source of the errors and the remedy to the problem in light of the fact that Parliament passed the motion on the basis of documents with errors.

Members further queried how the overall totals in the Supplementary Estimates could be right when the line items were incorrect.

Following deliberations on the evidence submitted by the Ministry of Finance the Committee resolved to form a Sub Committee to further scrutinize the issue and report to the Joint Committee. # MIN. NO. 01/2009 - PRELIMINARY

The meeting started with a word of prayer, and thereafter the Co-Chairs welcomed the Members and thanked them for attending. The Co-Chairs informed the Committee that the morning sitting will be dedicated to deliberation on the briefs from the budget office and in the afternoon sitting the Committee will hear from the Ministry of Finance at 2.30 pm and the Civil Society Group – Partnership for Change at 4.30 pm.

# MIN. NO. 02/2009 - BRIEF BY THE BUDGET OFFICE.

The Committee was informed that:-

- The votes and items in the documents tabled by the Hon. Imanayara in the House were true to the extent that the sub item in the principle item on the printed column was different from the estimates approved by the House in June 2008.
- The problem in the supplementary estimates books as presented to the House is the lack of a comprehensive presentation of affected principle items to the extent that all sub items were summed up for the report. Ordinarily the sub items do not appear in the parliamentary format of the printed estimates.
- There is no error in the supplementary estimates as they appear in the Supplementary Appropriations Bill. The error is only in the detail level were the data was generated from. The importation of such data leads to confusion. The error might be as a result of a computer bug during the data generation process whereby the computer did not pick some items.

Members deliberated on the presented analysis and resolved to focus the area of questioning on the cause of the error, the impact of the error on the approved estimates as well as the Supplementary Estimates presented by the Minister. The Committee adjourned at one O'clock. The next session will begin at 2. 30 pm.

# MIN. NO. 03/2009 – PRESENTATION BY THE MINISTRY OF FINANCE

The Committee heard that:-

- The Ministry experienced a computer error/bug that did not capture all the items. The ministry had launched investigations into its IT system to determine how the error occurred and its causes. The IT team investigating the cause of the error will report its findings to the permanent secretary tomorrow Saturday may 9<sup>th</sup>, 2009.
- The statement issued by the Minister in the House, to the effect that the figures presented to Parliament were correct, was prompted by the documents Laid in the House and that it was only latter that the Ministry realised that there was an error in that the computer programme only picked the items that had changes and left out the rest. The briefs that are normally given to the Minister neither contain nor capture areas with increases/ decreases or the details of the areas that were not affected by changes.
- The error had not affected the net figures in the Appropriations Act or the Supplementary Appropriations Bill. It only affected the items where the sub items were not picked by the computer and thus it could not tally all the figures.
- The transfer or allocation of funds is guided by the Constitution, the Appropriations Act and the Supplementary Appropriations Act therefore the Ministry of Finance is not

able to transfer funds to another Ministry without the approval of Parliament. Moreover the Integrated Financial Management system (IFMIS) adopted by the government will not capture such expenditure therefore transfers can't be effected.

Members however expressed concern that as a result of the error Parliament had approved an erroneous document even though the net figures were not affected.

The Ministry was directed to furnish the Committee with evidence to prove that the technical computer error had not in any way affected the overall Budget and that there was no intent to defraud the country of billions under the guise of computer error.

The Ministry undertook to provide further information and to brief the Committee on the findings of the team appointed to look at the cause of the computer error.

# MIN. NO. 04/2009 - PRESENTATION BY PARTNERSHIP FOR CHANGE

The Committee heard that:-

- The Supplementary Appropriations Bill was based on a contentious document and that Parliament ought to have full disclosure from the Ministry of Finance before the passing the Bill.
- There are 200 budget lines cutting across 36 Ministries with an accruing total of Kshs. 9.6 billion that was removed from the estimates approved by the House in June 2008.
- The contentious budget line items relate to allowances of teachers, police officers, nurses and civil servants.
- The Ministry inserted new budget lines totalling Kshs. 4.89 billion, that were not approved in the Appropriations Act, in the supplementary estimates.
- The National Budget contains debts that were condemned by the Controller and Auditor General in the report tabled by

the Finance Minister in Parliament on 7<sup>th</sup> May 2009. The debts relate to Ken Ren fertilizer factory which is non existent.

: :

• An independent forensic audit of the budget is required to determine the material inconsistencies which indicate that public funds could have been misapplied.

The Committee ordered the partnership for change group to provide documents relating to the new budget lines introduced by the Ministry of Finance in the supplementary Budget as well as the expenditure paid for by treasury without Parliamentary approval.

### MIN. NO. 07/2009 - PRELIMINARY

The meeting started with a word of prayer, and thereafter the Co-Chair welcomed the Members and thanked them for attending. He further thanked Treasury officials for responding to the Committee's invitation to attend the meeting. The Members raised a number of issues relating to the discrepancies in the supplementary estimates and debt management as a follow up to the meeting between the sub committee and the Ministry held on Friday May 8<sup>th</sup>, 2009.

## MIN. NO. 08/2009 - RESPONSE FROM MINISTRY OF FINANCE

The Committee was informed that:-

- (i) Discrepancies in the Supplementary Budget
- Initial investigations by the ministry indicate that there could have been human interference in the system in as far as the discrepancies are concerned however further audit will be undertaken to establish the actual cause of the discrepancy.
- As per the investigations undertaken by the Ministry and contrary to the list tabled by the Hon. Imanyara (36 Ministries affected) only 33 Ministries were affected by the error.
- The IT team tasked to probe the error reported that discrepancies were noted in form II, parliamentary format, but the detailed report that captures all the data is OK. Some Sector code items had problems and affected part II of the report that is normally presented to parliament.
- Some sector codes were missing or erroneously coded (mixed up) thus creating the discrepancies. Those with missing sector codes or erroneous coding were omitted by the computer and thus not summed up.
- The item 2110300 on personal allowances was the only one affected by the error. The system that captures this item is designed separately from the other files and when the error occurred the information under this item was not relayed.

Members raised concern that the argument posed by treasury could not hold in the face of the fact that some items with codes were not picked and those without codes were picked in certain line items. Equally the argument advanced in the previous meeting that only items with changes were picked could not hold since some items without change were picked and summed up.

### (ii) <u>Debt Management</u>

Members raised concern that the government had included certain debt repayments in the approved budget but the same was missing in the supplementary estimates. Members were also concerned that the government was paying certain debts, related to Ken Ren fertilizer factory, even after the controller and auditor general had raised queries.

Members noted that debt repayment consumed more than twenty percent of total budget yet the country there was no development initiated through the loans.

The Committee heard that:-

- On the four security contracts related to Anglo leasing the government had been sued and that the cases are s are ongoing to reach with the intention have arriving at a negotiated settlement.
- Close to 6 billion shillings was initially factored in the budget approved in June 2008 in the expectation that the settlement will be reached and government expected to pay. The figures were removed from the supplementary budget because the next round of talks/negotiations will fall in the next financial year therefore it was pointless to factor in the amounts yet they will not be used in the current financial year.
- An explanatory note on the payments was attached to the approved estimates stating that the amounts were for payment of security contracts under negotiations.
- The Ken Ren fertilizer project was initiated in 1975 and the government was a guarantor for the loans. The project did not take off. When the loans matured the government was sued by the financiers on the basis of valid agreements that the government had entered into to guarantee the loan. Kenya was obligated to honor the agreement.

Members raised concern that monies borrowed have not been used for the intended development. The Committee expressed the need for greater scrutiny on the usage of money borrowed and approval of parliament of any development borrowing.

The Ministry was advised to also scrutinize the development vote for any discrepancies and forward to the Committee written answers or memoranda on the questions posed by Members during the next meeting of the Joint Committee.

# MIN. NO. 06/2009 - PRELIMINARY

The meeting started with a word of prayer, and thereafter the Co-Chairs welcomed the Members, the Deputy Prime Minister and Ministry Officials present and thanked them for attending.

# MIN. NO. 07/2009 - BRIEF BY THE MINISTRY OF FINANCE.

The Committee was informed that:-

- (i) The Ministerial Statement that the Minister issued on Wednesday, May 5<sup>th</sup> 2009 dealt with the context of whether monies were stolen or there was fraud. The statement also focused on the Kshs. 8.5 billion alleged to be missing from the Ministry of Education as alleged by the Hon. Gitobu Imanyara, MP and to this extent the Minister did not mislead the House
- (ii) The Motion before the House was not inconsistent with the Supplementary Estimates tabled before the House with regard to the overall total figures. There was no inconsistency

between the requested amount in the Motion and the request as contained in the supplementary estimates.

.

- (iii) After the directive of Mr. Speaker, the Ministry launched investigations into the discrepancies in the Supplementary Estimates books and it appeared that there were inconsistencies particularly with regards to figures in the Supplementary Estimates and the printed figures as approved in June 2008.
- (iv) Ideally the printed estimates are locked and are not changed at any time after they have been approved by parliament. After investigations the inconsistencies amount to Kshs. 10, 763, 446, 275 and not the Kshs.
  9.67 billion alleged by the Hon. Gitobu Imanyara, MP. The inconsistencies affected 211 lines of the 26, 000 lines in the Printed Estimates and 25, 000 lines in the Revised Estimates.
- (v) The investigations further revealed that:-
  - Detailed budgets of line ministries did not contain the error as appearing in the Supplementary Books tabled in Parliament.
  - There was either a human error that was known to some officers who did not report the same for remedial action thus there might have been purposeful interference in the system.
- (vi) It is the first time that such an error is reported since the system was introduced three years ago.
- (vii) When the matter was noted the senior officers in Treasury were not informed.
- (viii) The Ministry has taken remedial action to mitigate the situation and prevent future recurrence of the problem by ensuring that the Budget Department , is a controlled zone, will only be accessed by authorization. The ministry also invited the IMF resident officer to

assess if there is money lost and it was established that there was no fraud.

Members noted that the integrity of treasury was at stake and called for the Minister to take decisive remedy and preventive action to ensure the integrity of the budget process.

# MIN. NO. 08/2009 – PRESENTATION BY THE CONTROLLER AND AUDITOR GENERAL

The Committee heard that the Kshs. 10.7 Billion discrepancy is not stolen and on the face value would mean that the money has not been spent.
