1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.On 26th June 2014, the Speaker of the National Assembly, Hon. Justin Muturi, M.P., pursuant to S.O 225 (2), conveyed a petition by the members of the Nairobi United IDPs regarding provision of funds for resettlement of internally displaced persons in Nairobi.
- 2. The petitioners prayed that the National Assembly makes a provision in the supplementary budget of FY 2014/2015 to allow resettlement of integrated IDPs from Nairobi County.
- 3. The Committee held various sessions in parliament and met with the Cabinet Secretary for Devolution and the petitioners with a view to interacting with them and receiving information regarding the petition.

2. SUBMISSIONS BY THE PETITIONERS

- 4. During its 79th Sitting held on Thursday 21st August 2014, the Committee met with Mr. Muigai Kangau, Chairman of the Nairobi United IDPs CBO, accompanied by Mr. Humphrey Ondego, Secretary and Ms. Esther Wangui, Treasurer who gave evidence on behalf of the members of the Nairobi United IDPs CBO.
- 5. The group comprises of people who were affected during the 2007-2008 post-election violence and at that time they were working and living in Nairobi.
- 6. Most of the group members were born and were living in Mathare, Kibira, Kamukunji and Njiru before being displaced in the Post-election violence of 2007/8, and did not own any land and the members consist of mostly small businessmen/women and that the group was registered as a community Based Organization on 21st June 2013.
- 7. During the profiling by the government, their names were omitted or listed with the wrong ID numbers and therefore different people were paid leaving some of the genuine victims without any compensation.
- 8. Representatives of the members are drawn from various camps, which include Mathare Chiefs Camp in Dagoretti, Waithaka D.Os office in Mathare, St. Benedict Camp in Mathare, PCEA camp in Mathare, Jonsaga

Camp in Huruma, Police Depot in Mathare, Omega Camp in Ruai, Njiru, Kamukunji, Makadara and Rift Valley in Waithaka.

- 9. The group commenced its meetings in 2009 and some of the sub groups have certificates from the Gender, Children and Social Services departments according to their respective camps within their location whereas some of their subgroups have been registered.
- 10. The group has met various government officials in its attempt to get assistance and in 2012, they received food aid which was withdrawn at the beginning of 2013 and since then they have sought assistance from the County Government but were referred back to the Ministry of Special programmes.
- 11. The Committee also learnt that some of the group members benefited from the Kshs. 10,000.00 and Kshs. 25,000.00 cash pay- out by the government to the Persons affected by the 2007/8 post- election violence while some of them are currently are living as integrated IDP's.

3. SUBMISSIONS BYTHE MINISTRY OF LANDS, HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT

The Committee received submissions from the Ministry of Lands, Housing and Urban Development and was informed as follows, THAT:

- 12. The role of the Ministry in the resettlement programme was to value, purchase, plan and survey land for the Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) already profiled.
- 13. The Profiling and placement of these farms was the Mandate of the Ministry of Devolution and Planning (Directorate of State for Special Programmes); in that respect, The Ministry of Lands procured 177 pieces of land in Trans-Nzoia, Nakuru, Nyandarua and Laikipia Counties, Measuring a total of 22,417 acres for the resettlement of 2007/2008 Post Election Violence victims. (Annex I)
- 14. The Committee was also informed that the Ministry of State for special Programmes also set up and managed the IDP camps from where they would recognize and transport the IDPs to the purchased farms for

resettlement. The then Ministry of Special programmes would then identify and determine which IDPs would be placed on which farm;

4. SUBMISSIONS FROM THE MINISTRY OF DEVOLUTION AND PLANNING

During its 77th Sitting held on Thursday 14th August 2014, the Committee met with the Cabinet Secretary for Devolution Ms. Anne Waiguru and was informed, THAT:

- 15. IDPs exist as part of the wider public that is served by the Government institutions in the vicinity. IDPs are therefore not discriminated in any way and access basic amenities such as schools and hospitals that other Kenyans access and that all facilities in the vicinity of IDPs are accessible to them, and in circumstances where social facilities are non-existent or are inadequate, the Ministry sets in to purposely intervene;
- 16. The government has adopted multiple approaches to address the plight of internally displaced persons and Victims of inter-communal violence are dealt with under either security or disaster management.
- 17. Currently, the displacement resulting from inter-communal violence or natural disasters fall under the domain of the Ministry of Interior and Coordination of National government as it relates to internal security and disaster management both of which are under that Ministry however, the responsibility of resettling Internally Displaced Persons(IDPs) falls under the Ministry of Devolution and planning which also provides relief and humanitarian assistance.
- 18. The Government is aware of the existence of IDPs in Nairobi and the Ministry has profiled some 19,146 individuals IDP and the records have 3,439 households, and that the government is also aware of some IDPS who were not profiled as it was difficult to establish when and where they were displaced. e. g the Njiru group and it cannot be established if they were indeed genuine 2007/8 post-election IDPs and their pre displacement homes.
- 19. Most IDPs in Nairobi were either tenants or small businessmen mostly in slum areas and their displacement was different in that most moved to other estates or within the estates after the clashes. Most lost nothing although some lost personal properties to looters, none lost land and a few were displaced from their houses. In view of this, the National

Humanitarian fund Board therefore considered most of these IDPs as integrated and decided to pay each of them Kshs.10,000.00 as startup capital they were therefore not considered for any other additional resettlement package.

- 20. The Committee learnt that during the 2007 Post Election violence, 663, 921 people (composed of 245,416 households) were displaced within the Country; 80,000 houses were destroyed countrywide and approximately 1300 lives lost while 640 IDP households fled to Uganda. At the height of the violence 350,000 IDPs sought refuge in 118 camps while 313,921 IDPs were integrated and given that IDPs were faced with different situations and needs, they were categorized into four main categories viz the 70,000 households (or 350,000 individuals) IDPs who agreed to voluntarily return to their farms through the Rudi Nyumbani operation.
- 21. The 8,754 families (including 2,574 Turkana IDPs) who formed self-help groups that were profiled by the ministry before the set deadline of 30th September 2008. These IDPs were resettled in government procured land with the exception of Kshs. 400,000.00 each in lieu of land settlement.
- 22. All the other IDPs numbering 165,846 households were categorized as integrated IDPs living among the various communities in the country. The integrated IDPs were paid Ksh.10,000 as startup capital.
- 23. There are 8,910 forest evictee households who were also resettled through cash payment programme.
- 24. In the last four years, the Ministry has received ksh.2, 856, 009, 000. 00 for IDPs which has been utilized totally in IDP related activities however there are a number of IDPs who have not been paid start-up capital but the payments will be made once they avail themselves for payment and subject to availability of resources.
- 25. The Ministry was allocated Ksh.705 million for resettlement of IDPs in the current Financial year which has been earmarked for the following activities:
 - a. Construction of IDP 2,400 houses in various government procured farms.
 - b. Complete survey work, balloting and showing of plots in a number of farms where IDPs are settled in government procured lands.

- c. Resettlement of 243 Kenya IDPs still in Uganda.
- 26. Since the Commencement of resettlement of IDPs in 2008,the government has spent Kshs. 15 billion in resettlement as follows;
 - a. Procurement of Land(entirely from the Ministry of Lands for purchase of Land)Ksh.3,279,100,360
 - b. Government Support to the Ministry of Special ProgrammesKshs. 4,776,351,167,
 - c. Food -Kshs. 966,766,245,
 - d. Non Food items -Kshs 117,615,000,
 - e. Turkana Houses-1,000,000,000
 - f. Payments mobilized from the Ministry of Lands, Interior and Treasury –Kshs. 3,319,600,000
 - g. ADB project Kshs. 1,700,000,000
- 27. The government has made cash transfers to IDPs through payment of ex gratia support of Kshs.10,000.00 per household to 170,416 households, ex gratia support of Kshs.25,000.00 to 37,843 heads of households and Kshs.400,000.00 in lieu of resettlement to 847 IDPs and 7,473 forest evictees. In addition, some 397 families who voluntarily returned from Uganda were each paid Kshs.37,000.00 which comprised Kshs.10,000 ex gratia support,Kshs.25,000 for burnt/destroyed houses and kshs.2,000 for transport totaling to kshs.14,689,000.00 (Annex 2).
- 28. Over 76,000 houses have been constructed for IDPs and 20,631 acres procured for and allocated to IDPs. The Ministry opted for cash payments as opposed to buying land for victims due to price escalations, locals wanting compromises for the land and victims refusing to move to other areas where land was bought.
- 29. The Ministry is also in the process of implementation the Prevention, Protection and Assistance to Internally Displaced Persons and Affected Communities Act of 2012(IDP Act) and IDP policy and is sourcing for the required budget. The act will enable the Ministry to address all forms of internal displacement;

The Committee was also informed as follows in regard to the parcels of land the Ministry bought for the IDPs and which have unresolved disputes: THAT

- 30. L.R no.8679/1, 8671, 8674 –Three Thirty Investment (Rose farm (2264 acres) was purchased at a cost of Kshs.566 million for IDP resettlement; however in December 2010, surveyors were stopped from proceeding with their work by the host community. The governments made concessions with the local political leadership in which 600 acres were offered to the local community to persuade them to allow resettlement of IDPs and 915 IDP and forest evictee households were expected to be moved to the farm on 19th March 2013 but this was after the general elections and the new political leadership objected to the matter this led to the government's withdrawal of the farm from the IDPs resettlement offer. The Farm now is in use by the Agricultural Development Corporation for seed production after consultations with the government. Since the funds used to procure the parcel for IDPs was meant for their resettlement, it may be necessary for the Ministry to be reimbursed an equivalent amount or size of land.
- 31. LR No.5605/3 Muhu Holdings-Due to the protracted period taken to agree on the sale, the lease for the land expired in 2011 while the purchase was still in progress and the land reverted back to government. There are 174 IDP household settled on the farm and the land owner has gone to court seeking compensation. The Ministry had appointed a team to negotiate with Muhu holdings on the possibilities of resolving the matter out of court but the land owner did not turn up. The matter is still pending in court.
- 32. L.R No.6504 Donga farm (subukia-755 acres) was bought at Kshs.98, 150,000. The land was registered under the name of Benjamin Njoroge (deceased). It was offered by the administrator. The land has a case in court after a dispute arose from the family members who claimed the power of attorney used to execute the agreement was a forgery. Currently there are 267 IDP families on the farm that were transported by the Ministry in September 2011. The matter is still pending in court.

- 33. Majority of forest evictees moved out of the forest areas after resettlement but a few still remain. The Ministries of Environment and Interior are looking into the matter with a view to establishing who moved and who remained.
- 34. The Ministry is in the process of establishing the National Consultative Coordination Committee under the Prevention, Protection and Assistance to Internally Displaced Persons and Affected Communities Act 2012, and

is awaiting submission of member's names from various institutions. The Chairman of the Committee has already been appointed.

The Committee was further informed that the Ministry has taken the following additional actions in protecting IDPs:

- 35. Regarding Safety and Security, inter-communal peace initiatives have been implemented in areas characterized by inter-communal conflict and 36 new police stations were established at a cost of 500 million in all PEV hotspots.
- 36. The government has facilitated reconstruction of 167 schools countrywide in areas that were affected by postelection violence. Boreholes, Dams, health centres and new schools have also been constructed in IDP resettlement areas, provided farm inputs to resettled IDPs and has supported IDP self Help groups.
- 37. The government through County administrators to County Commissioners has facilitated the acquisition of birth certificate,national Identification cards and voter registration IDP's in addition to issuing the title deeds are being processed by Ministry of lands for all resettled IDPs.
- 38. IDP grievances have been addressed through local courts, KNHRC, civil society, Parliament and County governments.

5. COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS

On the prayer that the National Assembly makes a provision in the supplementary budget of FY 2014/2015 to allow resettlement of integrated IDPs from Nairobi County. The Committee Observesas follows, THAT:

- a) The group has met various government officials in its attempt to get assistance and in 2012, they received food aid which was withdrawn at the beginning of 2013 and since then they have sought assistance from the County Government but were referred back to the Ministry of Devolution and Planning.
- b) The group comprises of people who were affected during the 2007-2008 post-election violence and at that time they were working and living in Nairobi. Most of the group members were born and were living in Mathare, Kibira,

Kamukunji and Njiru before being displaced in the Post-election violence of 2007/8, and did not own any land and the members consist of mostly small businessmen/women and that the group was registered as a community Based Organization on 21st June 2013.

- c) Delay in the operationalization of the Prevention, Protection and Assistance to Internally Displaced Persons and Affected Communities Act of 2012(IDP Act) and its National Consultative Committee is hampering efforts to determine policy issues concerning IDPs in the country.
- d) Most IDPs in Nairobi were either tenants or small businessmen mostly in slum areas and their displacement was different in that most moved to other estates or within the estates after the clashes. Although some lost personal properties to looters, none lost land and a few were displaced from their houses. In view of this, the National Humanitarian fund Board therefore considered most of these IDPs as integrated and decided to pay each of them Kshs.10, 000.00 as startup capital.

6. COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

On the prayer that the National Assembly makes a provision in the supplementary budget of FY 2014/2015 to allow resettlement of integrated IDPs from Nairobi County, the Committee Recommends as follows, THAT:

- a) Resources for the implementation of the Prevention, Protection and Assistance to Internally Displaced Persons and Affected Communities Act of 2012 (IDP Act) and IDP policy be provided for in the Budget for the 2015/2016 Financial year so that the Ministry can operationalize the Act.
- b) The Ministry for Devolution and Planning should immediately operationalize the National Humanitarian Fund Advisory Board for it to implement its Mandate.
