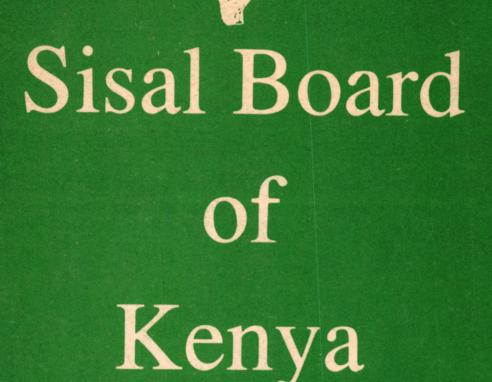
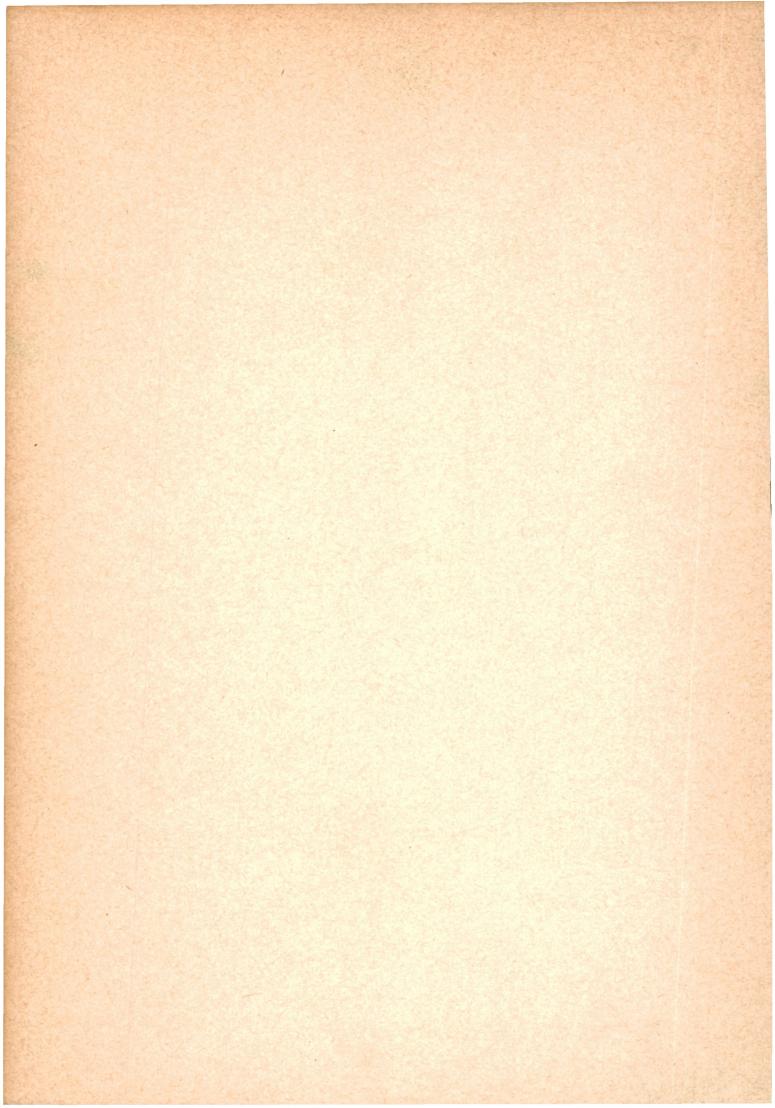

REVIEW OF THE SISAL INDUSTRY - 1992

a) Sisal Production

There was a marked decline in Sisal fibre production in 1992. This was the result of the fall in demand and world market prices which continued to drop over the two year period - 1991 and 1992. A total of 34,148 metric tons of fibre and tow was produced. This compared unfavourably with the 39,806 tons produced in 1991.

Production of the small-holder sisal fibre grade (U.H.D.S) fell to the disappointing level of only 635 metric tons. This amounted to slightly less than half the tonnage produced in 1991. The problem of low world market price and contracted demand therefore continued to adversely affect the production of this agricultural commodity by the small-holder farmers based largely in Nyanza and Eastern Provinces.

On a regional basis, production of all grades of sisal fibre and tow during the last two consecutive years was as follows:-

b) Sisal Marketing

World demand for sisal fibre suffered a considerable relapse over the years 1991 and 1992. The impact of this trend in demand and consequent decline in prices was however less severe on Kenya than for other producing countries.

In fact Kenya's volume share of the world sisal fibre market increased markedly in 1992. The levels of prices realized were however the lowest for two decades. In effect, farmers had no option but to sell sisal fibre at greatly discounted prices. In 1992, the country's farmers exported 29,089 metric tons of fibre and tow. This figure is decidedly higher than the 24,436 metric tons exported in 1991. Nevertheless, foreign exchange receipts from the export sales amounted to the equivalent of KShs. 332,624,543 as compared with the equivalent of KShs. 329,031,382 realized from the sale of only 24,436 tons in 1991. Prices therefore continued a drastically falling trend between 1991 and 1992.

The ten leading export country destinations for Kenya's sisal fibre and tow in 1992 were Portugal, South Korea, Japan, United Kingdom, Taiwan, Spain, Egypt, Belgium, Australia and Pakistan in that order. Twenty one other countries however imported sisal fibre from Kenya. Omitted from the list are Russia and the rest of the former U.S.S.R. It is to be noted that these countries together constituted a sizeable market for our sisal only two years ago.

As in the case of overseas buyers, the domestic sisal spinners took advantage of the low sisal prices and increased their purchases of sisal fibre. A total of 7,407 metric tons of fibre was sold to the local factories as compared with 6,063 tons sold in 1991.

The domestic sales realized KShs. 70,111,992 for the sisal farmers.

c) Sisal Board Operations

Inspite of reduced revenue receipts resulting from the low level of sisal prices, the Board continued to fully discharge its functions as required under the Sisal Industry Act (Cap. 341). An operational deficit of K£7,399 was consequently occassioned in the Board's Income and Expenditure Account for 1991/92 Financial year.

The Board's Inspectorate at Mombasa intensified its inspection procedures and quality control checks on exported sisal. The welcome result of all this was the rise in Kenya's share of the world's sisal fibre market at a time when world demand was rapidly declining.

As regards the Board's field activities, work on the small-holder sisal rehabilitation project continued but at a slow pace owing to lack of funds. A project planned for Gwasi Division of Homa Bay District will however be implemented during the next twelve months. The board also hopes to accelerate implementation of the sisal research project during the 1993/94 financial year.

NOTE 3 SISAL RESEARCH PROJECT

The Board has since the commencement of the above project incurred a sum of K £516. The benefits from the sisal research project are expected to accrue to the sisal industry in the long run. The costs incurred so far has been capitalised and no depreciation has been provided for.

NOTE 4 SMALL HOLDER PROJECT

The Board has started a small-holder sisal rehabilitation project whose main objective is to promote the sisal production by the small scale farmers. The board has so far spent a sum of K \pounds 264 in this project. This cost has also been capitalised and no depreciation provided for.

NOTE 5 STOCKS

Stocks consists of baling ropes, baling press oils and consumable parts and stationeries. The stocks have been valued at their cost price.

The prior period adjustments item of K£ 306 is the net balance arising from the reconciliation of the debtors and creditors accounts with the control accounts and the adjustment for overprovision for depreciation in the previous years.

NOTE 11 CESS INCOME

During the 1991/92 financial period a total of 36,585 metric tons of sisal was invoiced thus earning the Board a cess revenue of K£ 54,878. This reflects a drop of K£ 4,844 or 8% from the 1990/91 financial year when a total of 39,814 tons were invoiced earning the Board a sum of K£ 59,722.

NOTE 12 RENTAL INCOME

During the 1991/92 financial year the Board earned a gross rental income K£ 104,100 from its rented godowns. This reflects an increase of 33% over the 1990/91 gross rental income of K£ 78,241

NOTE 13 INSPECTION SERVICE CHARGE

The Board earned K£ 101,302 from this source of revenue during the 1991/92 financial year which is an increase of 8% over the 1990/91 income when K£ 93,795 was realised.

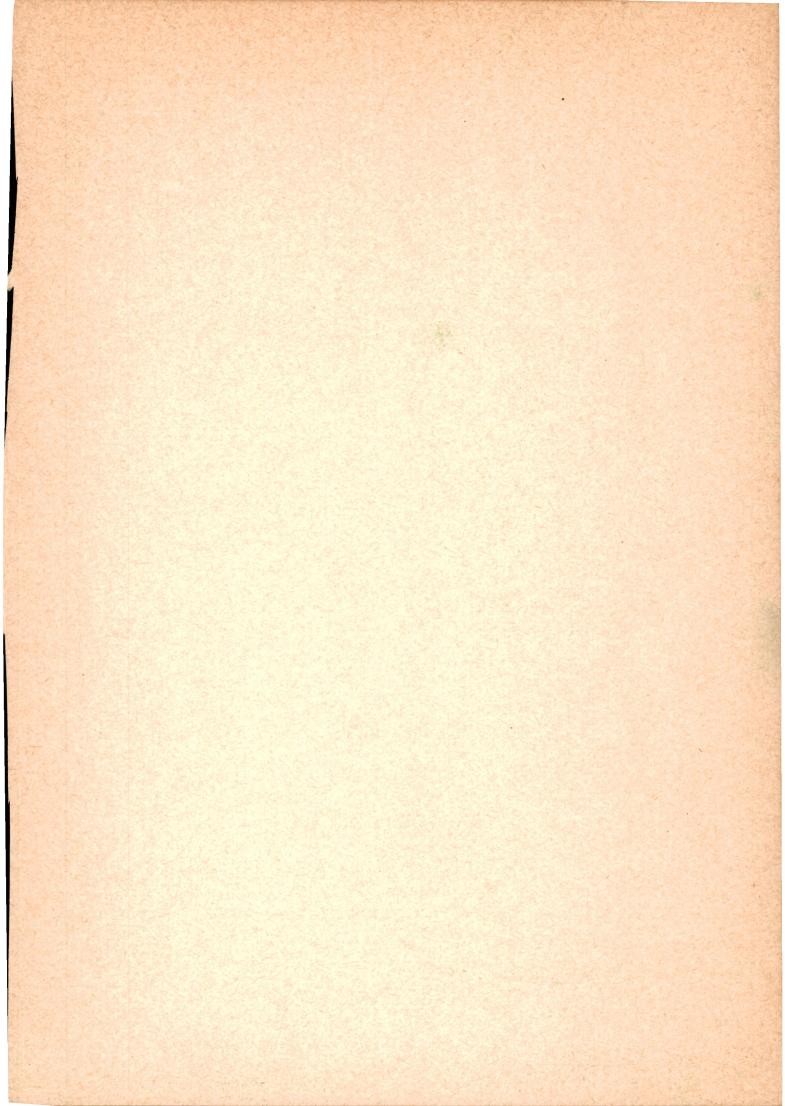
