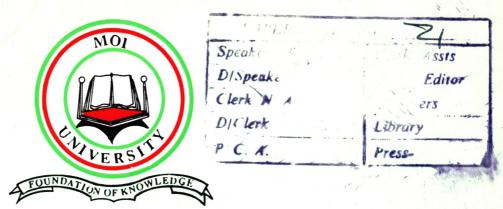

# Report of the Vice-Chancellor

# for the 1998/99 Financial Year

I am pleased to present the Annual Report and Accounts of Moi University for the 1998/99 financial year. The salient features of the report are as follows:-

#### **Financial Performance**

The University recorded a surplus of Kshs. 9,131,000/=during the year under review. This represents a reduction of 40 per cent from the previous year's surplus of Kshs.15,154,000/=. The main reason for this drastic reduction is that there was a higher increase in expenditure relative to the increase in income. The expenditure increased by 7.3 per cent as compared with a 6.5 per cent growth on income. The major expenditure increases were on items related to the provision of administration and central services including repairs and maintenance of premises.

Nevertheless, the mere fact that the University recorded a surplus is highly commendable considering the general economic out-turn during the period. As in the previous year, this positive performance was achieved as a result of prudent financial management and control.

#### **Indebtedness**

Inspite of this positive performance, the University was unable to liquidate all her debts during the year. It remained indebted to both her recurrent and development creditors to the tune of Kshs. 63,660,000/= and Kshs.91,086,000/= respectively as at 30<sup>th</sup> June 1999.

However, the government undertook to avail sufficient funds to the University to facilitate the settlement of some of these debts and particularly those related to Capital Development projects. It is expected that this commitment would be fulfilled in the subsequent financial year - 1999/2000.

#### **Introduction of New Academic Programmes**

During the year under review the University introduced new academic programmes which were later renamed as the Privately Sponsored Students Programmes (PSSP). The programmes were launched in October 1998 with an initial enrolment of 340 students. It covers undergraduate courses in Education, Law, Business Management and Production Technology. It is envisaged that the programmes would cover all the courses offered by the University under the regular degree programmes. However, the major constraint in this respect is shortage of physical space in terms of tuition, library and laboratory facilities.

The major objectives of the Privately Sponsored Students Programmes are:-

- → to provide opportunities for further education at Moi University to those who are eligible
- → to support the University mission and vision as may be determined by Council from time to time
- → to generate income for the improvement of the academic environment of the University, enhancement of staff retention and supplementation of the Exchequer grants.
- → to enhance equity and access to further education by the disadvantaged in terms of provision of scholarships through annual contributions to an Endowment fund.



#### Student Matters

A number of organisations continued to support our students during the year, the major one being the Higher Education Loans Board (HELB) through the provision of loans and bursaries. The others which provided, mainly bursaries, are the Visha Oswal Community, the Chandaria Foundation, Ratansi and the European Union. I take this opportunity to thank them most sincerely for their support. I also wish to appeal to other philanthropic organizations to extent financial support to our needy students in future.

### Donor Support

The University maintained close relationships with the majority of donors during the year under review. As a result, it enjoyed financial support in terms of provision of research grants and award of scholarships to the Academic and Senior Administrative Staff. The major donor during the year was the Dutch government whose financial support remained on course under the MHO-Programmes. Under this programme the University benefited immensely in various areas. These include the central administration and some faculties through the supply of computer equipment, construction of limited physical facilities and in particular laboratories and staff development.

Apart from the Dutch Government, the University also received support from the Ford Foundation, DAAD, Rockfeller Foundation, European Union, ACU, AAU and the Lake Victoria Environmental Management Programme among others.

# Appointment as Vice Chancellor

In July 1998, I took over as the new Vice—Chancellor of Moi University following my appointment to this challenging position by the Chancellor. I therefore take this opportunity to sincerely thank the Chancellor of Moi University who is also the President of the Republic of Kenya and Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces - Hon. Daniel T. arap Moi, EGH for the appointment. I also undertake to discharge the duties bestowed upon me to the best of my ability. Similarly, I must thank my immediate predecessor Prof. Justin Irina for the able manner in which he steered the institution throughout his tenure and wish him success in his new appointment as the Secretary to the Commission for Higher Education.

# Appreciation

Once again, I take this opportunity to thank the government for the continued financial support extended to Moi University during the year through the parent Ministry of Education, Science & Technology. Special thanks also go to our other donors who supported the University in one way or the other during the period.

Lastly, I wish to thank all the Council members for their invaluable guidance and the staff and students for their hardwork and cooperation throughout the year under review.

# Report of the Auditor-General (Corporations) on The Accounts of Moi University for the Year Ended 30th June, 1999

I have examined the Accounts of Moi University for the year ended 30<sup>th</sup> June, 1999 in accordance with Section 29 (2) of the Exchequer and Audit Act, (Cap. 412). I have obtained all the information and explanations required for the purpose of the audit. Proper books of account have been kept by the University and the Accounts are in agreement therewith and comply with Moi University Act, 1984.

In my opinion, and subject to the material matters referred to here below the Accounts, when read together with the Notes thereon, fairly represent the financial state of affairs of the University as at 30<sup>th</sup> June, 1999 and of its surplus and cash flow for the year then ended.

#### 1. Fixed Assets

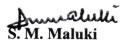
The University's Balance Sheet foxed assets figure of Kshs.3,871,529,000 as at 30<sup>th</sup> June, 1999 includes one parcel of land at Homa Hills valued at Kshs.2,400,000 for which the University only holds a letter of allotment. In addition, two parcels of land previously donated to the University and located at Kibuswa and Marigat valued at Kshs.2,500,000 each and for which the university has not obtained title deeds are excluded from these Account apparently because the University's ownership of these plots is considered doubtful. Under the circumstances, the accuracy and correctness of the University's Balance Sheet fixed assets figure of Kshs.3,871,529,000 as at 30<sup>th</sup> June 1999 cannot be confirmed.

# 2. Cash and Bank Balances -kshs.29,866,000

During the year 1998/99 the University operated a total of 65 bank accounts with various banks, out of which only 21 accounts were reconciled as at 30<sup>th</sup> June, 1999. The remaining 44 accounts with balances totalling Kshs.22,706,000, had no reconciliation schedules or analyses to support the bank balances. Consequently and in the absence of such schedules, the accuracy and correctness of the Balance Sheet Cash and Bank Balances figure of Kshs.29,866,000 as at 30<sup>th</sup> June, 1999 could not be confirmed.

# 3. Budgetary Control

During the year 1998/99 the University exceeded its total annual budget allocation of Kshs.876,243,860 by Kshs.72,958,680. The over-expenditure of Kshs.72,758,680 was mainly attributable to budgetary overrun in respect of medical allowances and such other benefits to staff as electricity and water payments, whose annual budget allocation was exceeded by Kshs.47,370,120. Approval for the budget overrun as required under Section 12 of the State Corporations Act (Cap 446) was not seen.

### **Notes to the Accounts**

## for the Year Ended 30th June, 1999

### 1. Significant Accounting Policies

- 1.1 The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets.
- 1.2 Income from grants and fees represent only the amount receivable in relation to the financial year 1998/99.
- 1.3 Fixed assets are stated at cost or professional valuation.

Depreciation is provided for at annual rates estimated to write off the assets over their expected useful lives. The rates are:

Building - 2%

Plant, Equipment and Furniture - 12.5%

Motor Vehicles - 25%

Depreciation is on straight-line basis and it is charged to the Capital Reserves.

- 1.4 Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value.
- 1.5 The cost of library books and teaching materials are written off to expenditure as incurred.
- 1.6 Appropriation for specific purpose represent revenue generated by some departments and unspent balance on certain votes, carried forward to meet expenditure in the ensuing year.
- 1.7 Deans Committee research grants are votes set aside from current and past financial years. The uncommitted balance on each research grant is carried forward until the related research project is completed.
- 1.8 The main pension scheme for the University's staff is the Moi University Pensions Fund, which was started from 1st July 1991. The University's contributions to this scheme have been charged to the relevant Salaries votes.
- 1.9 Values for equipment donated are estimated by the University or as advised by donors

#### 2. Contingent Liabilities

(ii) Capital Development project creditors are likely to demand interest and penalties on outstanding payments. The same has not been accrued in the accounts since the actual amount in each case is still unknown.

#### 3. Curency

The accounts are expressed in Kenya Shillings and the amounts are rounded to the nearest one thousand shillings.

### 4. Legal Status

The University is a body corporate established in Kenya under the Moi University Act., 1984.

The chances of the ownership of the two parcels of land passing on to the University are also remote since one of the donors is now deceased without any legal document to effect future transfer.

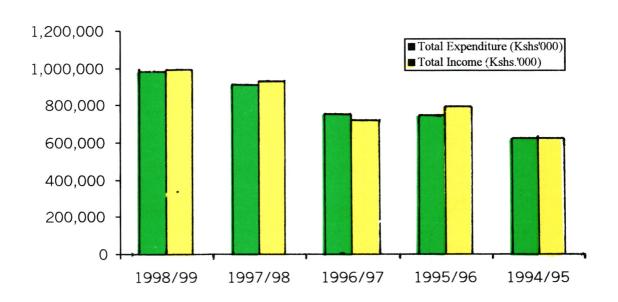

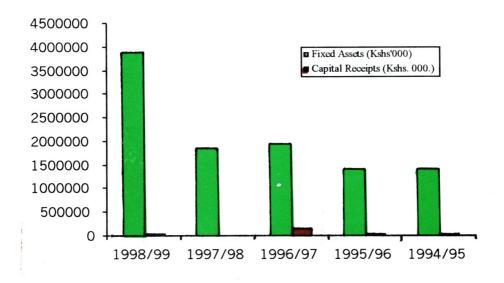

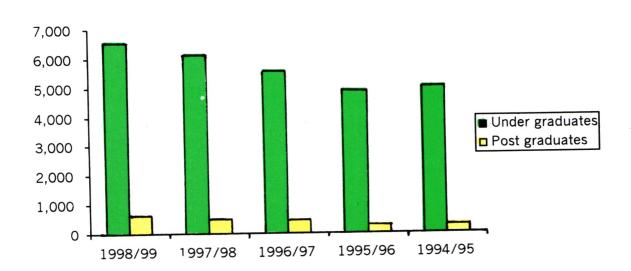


# **Capital Development Chart**
