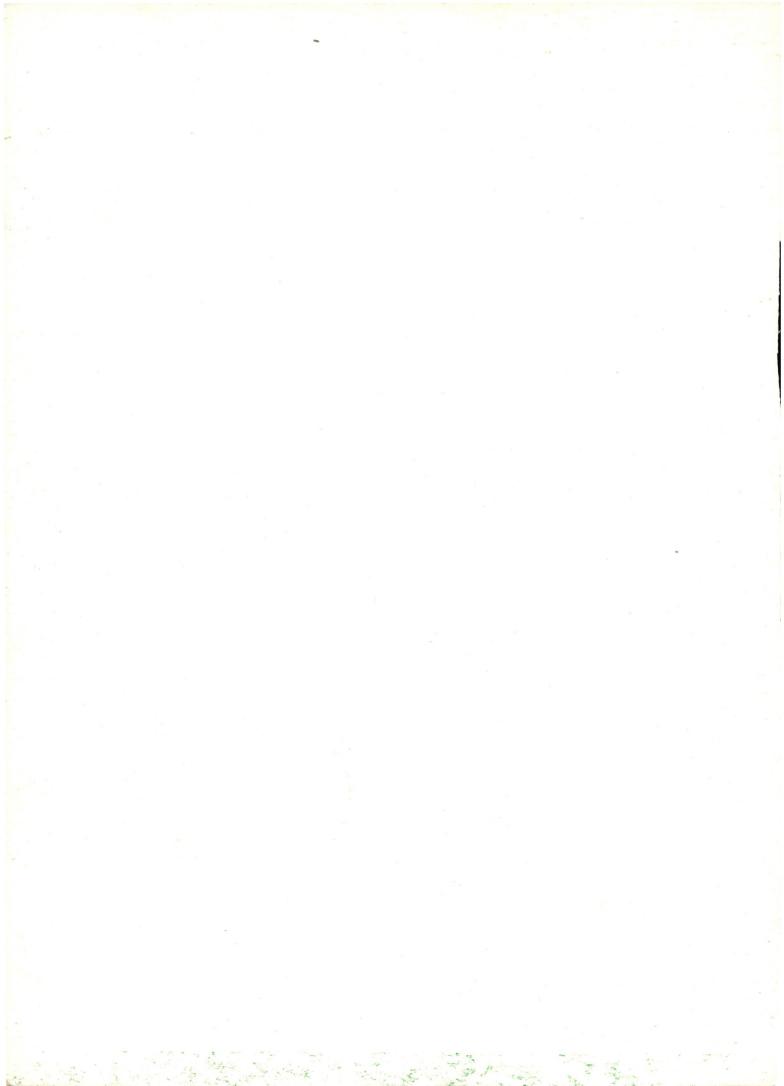

SISAL INDUSTRY REVIEW - 1997

(a) Sisal Production

There was a marked decline in sisal fibre production in 1997 as compared to 1996. The 1997 production was 20,314 metric tons compared to 28,278 metric tons for 1996. This was as a result of Elnino rains which halted production in several estates especially in the Coastal area and also Planting programme had been low in several estates due to drought in the 1st half of 1997.

On regional basis, production of all grades of sisal fibre and tow during the last two consecutive years was as follows:-

(b) Sisal Marketing

Between 80-90% of all sisal fibre and tow produced in Kenya is exported overseas to over 30 countries every year. The rest is sold locally. In 1997 out of the production of 20,314 metric tonnes a total of 17,457 were exported earning the country Ksh.614,690/=.

In 1996 a total of 21,038 metric tonnes were exported earning the country an equivalent of Ksh. 779,369,574/=. In 1997 a total of 2,857 metric tonnes of sisal was sold locally earning farmers a total of Ksh 82,600,000/=. Our sisal fibre is still in high demand due to its high quality and wide spread importing countries stretching from Europe to the Far East. Currently the average price of the widely exported sisal grades - UG and 3L stands at US dollar 735 per metric tonne f.o.b. Mombasa.

The top ten importers are: Spain, Portugal, Saudi Arabia, Belgium, Japan, United Kingdom, South Africa, Korea, Australia and Syria.

(c) Sisal Board Operations Results

For the fourth year running, the Board realized a financial surplus from the 1996/97 operational budget. The result was achieved despite the low fibre production.

The Board's Inspection at Mombasa continued to intensify its inspection procedure and quality control checks on exported sisal. The welcome result of all this was the maintenance of steady demand of Kenya's premium sisal used for blending purposes in the world's sisal fibre markets.

As regards the Board's field activities, the Product and Market Development of Sisal and Henequen Products Project took off towards the end of 1997 and is now in its second year of implementation and is expected to continue for another three years.

A review of Past Sisal Research Results and Current Cultivation Practices was carried out in Kenya and Tanzania and successfully completed in April, 1998.

A sisal variety performance trial was planted towards the end of 1997 in Kilifi, Kibwezi and Nakuru and the Nurseries are now ready for transplanting into the main fields.

The animal feeds trials base on feeding dairy and beef cows, goats and sheep on sisal decortication waste and boles, both fresh and ensiled was started at Kilifi Plantations Ltd. in Kilifi. In 1998 all the necessary infrastructure including equipment and animal sheds were put in place and it is expected that feeding trials will commence in April 1999.

A component on development of an improved flume tow recovery technology and equipment was also started at Rea Vipingo Estate in Kilifi. The development and manufacture of the equipment is at an advanced stage and tests will commence in December 1998.

The process of initiating a study into development of efficient and cost effective sisal fibre extraction technology is also at an advanced stage at Kenya Industrial Research and Development Institute. It is expected that a technology based on the sugar milling principle will be ready for trial tests of production of pulpable sisal fibre, early in 1999.

The process of developing sisal tissue culture technology has also been initiated at the plant quarantine station. A scientist has already completed a one month training on Agave tissue culture in Mexico and has now embarked on expansion and adapting the laboratory to accommodate sisal.

Preliminary results from the ongoing activites are expected to start flowing in mid of year 2000.

In Tanzania, the project has also taken off and a number of activities area already underway.

REPORT OF THE AUDITOR-GENERAL (CORPORA TIONS) ON THE ACCOUNTS OF KENYA SISAL BOARD FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 1997

I have examined the accounts of the Kenya Sisal Board for the year ended 30 June 1997 in accordance with the provisions of Section 29 (2) of the Exchequer and Audit Act (Cap 412). I have obtained all the information and explanations that I required for the purpose of the audit. Proper books of account have been kept by the Board and the accounts are in agreement therewith and comply with the Sisal Board Act (Cap 341).

Subject to the matters referred to herebelow, in my opinion, the Balance Sheet and the Income and Expenditure account when read together with the notes thereon, present a true and fair view of the Board's state of affairs as at 30 June 1997 and of its surplus and cash flow for the year then ended.

1. FIXED ASSETS

The Balance Sheet fixed assets figure of Kshs. 9,073,175 includes Agricultural Show of Kenya stand valued at Kshs.256,034 which has been used by Kenya Broadcasting Corporation since 1996. However, the Board has not been able to produce, for audit verification, the lease agreement signed between the Board and the Corporation stipulating the terms under which the Corporation uses this stand. The Board has also not recovered any rent from the Corporation since 1996 and Board's surplus of Kshs.3,312,677 is understated to the extent of the rent income not recovered from the use of this property by the Kenya Broadcasting Corporation.

2. DEBTORS AND PREPAYMENTS

- 2.1. The debtors and prepayments figure of Kshs.891,280 includes cash advances totalling Kshs.370,106 to the Chief Executive of the Board some of which have been outstanding for over two years. The Board has not explained under what terms these advances were made and how they will be recovered.
- 2.2. Further, the debtors figure also includes pension payments amounting to Kshs.77,690 made to two former employees of the Board by the Board as the Insurance Company with which the Board was running its staff pension scheme was under liquidation. The board has not advised me of any arrangements with the liquidator on how to make good the debt or even how the rest of the pension funds will be made available to the pensioners.

3. CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS

During the year under review, tenders were invited for the re-construction of the Board's Godown number four which had been destroyed by fire. A review of the quotations indicated that the contract was, vide minute number 22/96 of November 1996, awarded to the fifth lowest bidder who quoted Kshs. 11,999,500 while the lowest bidder quoted Kshs. 9,126,264.

Had the contract been awarded to the lowest bidder, the Board would have saved Kshs.2,873,236. The Board has not given satisfactory reasons for the awarding of the contract to the fifth lowest bidder which resulted in the overpayment of Kshs.2,873,236.

NOTE 3 - WORK IN PROGRESS

As at the close of the last financial year, Godown No. 4 was damaged by fire and written off. As at the close of this financial year, the value of work done on the above Godown was Ksh. 9,200,000/=.

NOTE 4 - STOCKS

Stocks are valued at their cost price and they consist of baling ropes and baling press oils at Kshs. 2,933/= and Ksh 16,178/= respectively.

NOTE 5 - PMDSHP PROJECT

As at the end of 1996/97 financial year, the Board had incurred Kshs. 124,540/= on behalf of Product and Market Development of Sisal and Henequen Project of which it expects a reimbursement.

NOTE 11 - CESS INCOME

During the 1996/97 financial year a total of 24,650 metric tons of sisal was levied cess earning the Board a sum of Kshs. 739,479/= compared to 27,781 metric tons in 1995/96 when the Board earned about 11% (Kshs.93,940). This is as a result of low production level in the entire 1996.

NOTE 12 - RENT INCOME

The rental income of Kshs. 5,826,782 reflects an increase of Kshs. 430,790/= which represents 8% over the previous year when a sum of Kshs. 5,395,992 was realised from this source. This increase is as a result of an upward adjustment on the rental charges on the Boards three remaining godowns and the proceeds from consequential loss of rent claim following fire damage to godown No. 4 at the close of the last financial year.

NOTE 13 - INSPECTION SERVICE CHARGE

During the 1996/97 financial year the Board earned a sum of Kshs. 4,183,610/= from this source of revenue. This reflects a revenue drop of about 6% (Kshs. 254,391) from the previous years earnings when a sum of Kshs. 4,438,001 was received from this source. This is attributable to a reduced produced level occassioned by depressed shilling equivalent of export sales.

NOTE 14 - LICENCE FEES

During the 1996/97 financial year the Board earned a sum of Kshs. 57,360/= from this source of revenue. This source of revenue registered a drop of Kshs. 10,330/= or 15% from the previous financial year when a sum of Kshs 67,690/= was received. This drop is due to the reduced export sales and hence fewer export licences.

NOTE 15 - REBALING CHARGE

Revenue from this source increased by Kshs. 176,550/= (322%) from Kshs. 54,820 in 1995/96 to Ksh.231,370/= in 1996/97. This increase is attributed to more bales having been rebaled and thus more charges.

NOTE 16 - INTEREST INCOME

This is net accrued from the proceeds of material damage claim to godown No. 4 and the consequential loss claim having been placed in fixed deposit account for three months.

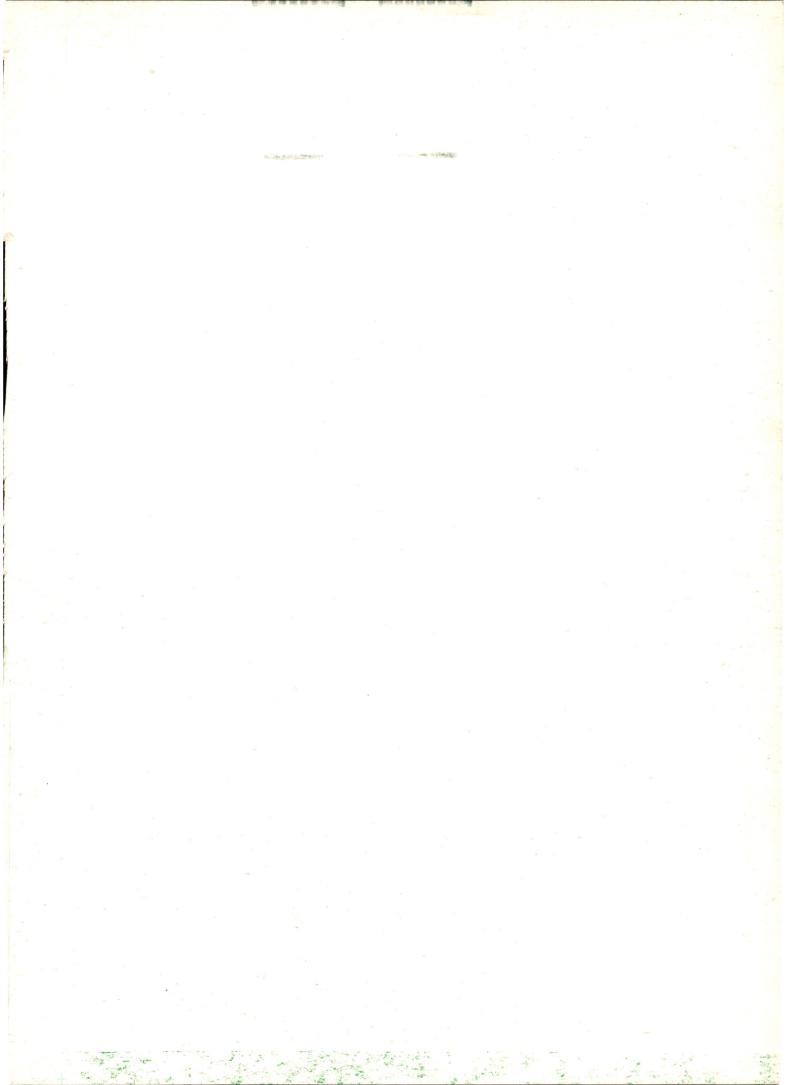
