SISAL INDUSTRY REVIEW - 2001

(a) Sisal Production

There was a slight increase in Sisal fibre and tow production in 2001 as compared to 2000. The 2000 production was 21,430 metric tones compared to 23,209 metric tones for 2001. The small increase in production was as a result of extensive replanting programme undertaken by some estates in 1998.

On regional basis production of all grades of sisal fibre and tow during the last two consecutive years was as follows:-

(b) Sisal Marketing

Over 80% of all sisal fibre and tow produced in Kenya is exported overseas to over 38 countries every year. The rest is sold locally. In 2001 out of the production of 23,209 Metric tonnes, a total of 15,579 Metric tonnes were exported, earning the country Kshs. 627,898,594/= compared to 15,627 Metric tonnes exported in 2000 that earned the country Kshs. 549,949,455. In 2001 a total of 6,220 Metric tonnes of sisal were sold locally earning farmers a total of Kshs. 196,416,408/=.

Our sisal is being used on an increasing scale for the manufacture of higher added value end products particularly pulp for speciality paper production and none woven products for reinforcement purposes. Currently the average price of the widely exported sisal grades UG or 3L stands at US\$594 per metric tonne F.O.B. Mombasa.

The top ten importers of our sisal in 2001 were: - China, Saudi Arabia, Spain, Belgium, Egypt, Japan, Mexico, U.K., Indonesia and Italy.

(c) Sisal Board Operation

The Board realised reasonable financial surplus from the 2000/2001 operational budget inspite of unfavourable prices offered in the entire financial year.

The Board intensified its Inspection procedures and quality control checks at its Inspectorate Mombasa. These measures have maintained steady demand for Kenya premium sisal used for blending purposes in the world's sisal fibre market.

As regards the Board's field activities, the product and market development of sisal and Henequen products project which took off towards the end of 1997 and is now in its final year of completion.

A two year extension was approved to complete components which had not been concluded.

Among the major areas the project focused on :-

- Exploration and development of alternative uses of sisal fibre, sisal decortication waste, boles and poles.
- Revival of sisal research
- Encouragement of more participation of small holders in sisal production and marketing.

The main activities that already commenced are: -

- (i) Animal feed trials using sisal decortication waste and boldes.
- (ii) Sisal Variety trials
- (iii) Development of micropropagation techniques (Tissue Culture) for rapid multiplication of sisal planting materials.
- (iv) Development of efficient flume tow recovery process.
- (v) Development of more efficient sisal fibre extraction technology particularly for pulping purposes.
- (vi) Review of past sisal research results and current production practices.

REPORT OF THE AUDITOR GENERAL (CORPORATIONS) ON THE ACCOUNTS OF KENYA SISAL BOARD FOR THE YEAR ENDED3OTH JUNE 2001

I have examined the Accounts of Kenya Sisal Board for the year ended 30th June 2001 in accordance with the provisions of Section 29(2) of the Exchequer and Audit Act (Cap 412). I have obtained all the information and explanations considered necessary for the purpose of audit. Proper books of account have been kept and the Accounts, which are in agreement therewith, comply with the Sisal Board Act, Cap 341.

In my opinion and except for the matters set out herebelow the Accounts, when read together with the Notes thereon, present a true and fair view of the Board's financial state of affairs as at 30th June 2001 and of its surplus and cashflows for the year then ended.

1. DEBTORS AND PREPAYMENTS

The Balance Sheet debtors figure of Kshs.l,025,152 as at 30th June 2001, and as was the case in previous years, still includes cash advances to the Board's Chief Executive totalling Kshs.313,275/=, some of which have remained outstanding for over five years. The Board has, however, not explained why it continued to make further advances to the same officer before recovering old advances. In addition the Board has also not indicated when and how these long outstanding advances to the Chief Executive would be recovered. Further and as stated in the report for the previous year, the Board has still not clearly explained how it intends to recover an amount of Kshs.65,794/= paid as advance pensions to former Board employees and which was recoverable from pension funds held by the Kenya National Assurance Company, now in liquidation.

2. CONSTITUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

During the year 2000/2001, the Board operated without a Board of Directors and as a result all the functions including policy decisions normally performed by a Board of Management were undertaken by the Board's Chief Executive. Although the Parent Ministry was notified of the expiry of the Board of Management in March 2000, it is not clear why a new board has not been constituted.

NOTE 9 - CESS INCOME

During the 2000/2001 financial year, a total of 17,131 metric tonnes of sisal were levied cess earning the Board a sum of KShs.513,951/= compared to 18,283 metric tonnes in 1999/2000 where the Board earned KSh.548,506/=. This represents a revenue drop of (about 6.3%) KSh.34,555/=. This is as a result of low production level in the entire 2000

NOTE 10 - RENT INCOME

The rental income of KSh.9,099,043/= reflects an incease of KSh.203,635/= which represents 2.3% over the previous year when a sum of KSh.8,895,408/= was realised from this source. This increase is a result of an upward adjustment on the rental charges on the Board's three godowns.

NOTE 11 - INSPECTION SERVICE CHARGE

During the 2000/2001 financial year, the Board earned a sum of KShs.3,566,268/- from this source of revenue. This reflects a revenue increase of Ksh. 261,332/=which represents 7.9% over the previous year when a sum of Ksh.3,304,936 was realised from this source. This is due to the revised exchange rate.

NOTE 12 - LICENSES FEES

During the 2000/2001 financial year, the Board earned KSh.58,690/= from this source of revenue. This reflects a revenue increase of KSh.9,390/= which represents 19% over the previous financial year when a sum of KShs.49,300/= was received.

NOTE 13 - REBALING CHARGES

During the 2000/2001 financial year, the Board earned a sum of KShs.274,250/= from this source of revenue. This reflects a drop of about (26%) (KShs. 96,050)' from the previous financial year when a sum of Kshs. 370,300/= was received. This is attributed to fewer bales having been rebaled and thus lower charges.
